"All Through The Night" at Capitol, Summerside

The opening scene cleverly sets the mood, showing the ex-gangster Bogart at lunch with some of his henchmen. The boys are playing with some toy soldiers, mapping out the kind of military strategy they think the British should use. Bogart laughs at them and tells them the war is none of their business.

They all go off to the ball game, but Bogart is called away by an S.O. from his mother. Mr. Miller, the baker who lives next door, has disappeared. Bogart discovers that his murdered body in the cellar and also gets a glimpse of a lovely young stranger, played by Kaaren Verne, who seems to have some trail leads to the night club where she works as a singer, but she disappears almost under his eyes.

Trailing her further leads him to an old warehouse and a nest of enemy agents. He manages to get the girl away from them, and from there he learns about the nefarious work of the Gestapo right in New York. Miller was murdered, she explains, because he refused to work for them. Special Order Covering Retail Poultry Prices

To clear up any misunderstanding as to the retail prices of poultry, Mr. G. H. Harbour, Prices and Supply Representative of the War-time Food and Trade Board, calls attention to the following order:

Order 197, respecting Prices of Poultry, states, re Retail Sales: 5 (1) Except with the written authority of the Food Administrator, no person selling poultry at retail in any province shall buy or otherwise acquire, either directly or indirectly, and no person shall buy or otherwise acquire on his behalf, any class and grade of any kind of poultry in the packing or deficiency periods for such kind and class of poultry at a total delivered cost in excess of the maximum price for sales at wholesale for that class and grade of that kind in that period in that province, together with cost of transportation, from the buyer's nearest railway station to his place of business if delivery is by railway.

(2) For the purpose of this Section, any person who acquires and kills any live poultry shall be deemed to have acquired poultry.

(3) The price at which any person may sell or offer to sell any retail any class and grade of any kind of poultry shall not exceed the sum of the following: (a) Its lawful delivered cost of that class and grade of that kind or grade of poultry, not exceeding the maximum delivered cost for such kind, class and grade as set forth in Section 5 hereof (except the difference between railway freight and railway express charges, if any, included in such cost), and (b) a markup (percentage of cost) not exceeding the markup percentage of cost customarily obtained by him during the basic period from September 15 to October 11, 1941, on poultry of the same or substantially similar kind, class and grade but in no event exceeding 6 cents per pound of poultry;

(c) In cases where such person regularly made a charge for drawing poultry during the said basic period, an amount to cover such service, if rendered, not exceeding the amount so charged during such period, and no event exceeding 10 cents per head of poultry;

(4) The Food Administrator or any person authorized by the Board may with the concurrence of the Administrator of Retail Trade, specify a markup or mark-up that shall apply to any person selling poultry at retail and any markup so specified shall be substituted for the markup referred to in clause (b) of subsection (1) of this section.

7. Order No. 70 of this Board, dated the 9th day of December, 1941, is hereby revoked.

8. This Order shall be effective on and after the 2nd day of November, 1942.
