LAURIER SPEAKS

On the Transvaal Question And Moves

A STRONG RESOLUTION

Of Sympathy for Britons in South Africa—Carried—God Save the Queen.

OTTAWA July 31.—[Special].—Sir Wilfred Laurier delivered a speech today on the Transvaal situation. He showed there were 80,000 British subjects in the Transvaal who were allowed to develop that country, yet they had been denied participating in the administration.

They were subject to all the burdens of citizenship but without its rights. The treaty that made the Transvaal independent also gave the Queen suzerainty there. He pointed out how Canada is situated. It seemed to him therefore that the sympathy of the Canadian Government should be extended to our fellow countrymen in South Africa and that we ought to forward them our good fellowship and to show our hearts were with theirs.

Premier Laurier regretted that Sir Charles Tupper was absent, but read a letter from him.

The resolution passed, after which both sides sang God Save the Queen.

TWO MEN DROWNED

Quarrelled While Drunk in a Boat.

CAPTAIN OF GASPESIA

Carries Away Her Register—Constance Again Beats the Glencairn.

NORTH SYDNEY, July 31.—(Special).—Three men belonging to Sydney named Doyle, Morrison, and Kehoe, all intoxicated, went out in a sail boat on Sunday.

A row took place, the boat upset and Doyle, and Kehoe were drowned. Morrison managed to cling to the boat.

Doyle was a widower. Kehoe leaves a wife and several children. The schooner Sea Nymph, Capt. Reeve, from St. Pierre with coal, sprang a leak 20 miles off the light and sank.

The crew lost their effects. The vessel was owned in Halifax.

HALIFAX, July 31.—(Special).—Trouble is reported regarding Captain Farquhar's ownership of the S. S. Gaspesia.

The former captain left unceremoniously for England, taking the ship's register with him.

MONTREAL, July 31.—(Special).—The second race for the Seawanhaka Cup between Glencairn 3rd and Constance was won today by the latter, 54 seconds ahead.

QUEEN'S CO. JUDGESHIP

Discussed—Laurier Says Not Brought to His Notice—Will Consult Davies.

OTTAWA, July 31.—(Special).—When the house met today the Premier, in the absence of Hon. Mr. Blair, introduced the Bill authorizing the Government to construct the branch line from Charlottetown to Murray Harbor.

The Bill was read a first time. This afternoon Mr. Martin asked the Premier why the appointment was not made of a Judge for the Queen's County Court?

The Court was called for this week and all concerned would be put to great inconvenience.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the Opposition had given the Government so much work that there had been no time to attend to this.

Mr. McDonald thought the reason given was not sufficient.

The position had been vacant for two months. The cause was not that the Opposition here made trouble, but there was trouble among the rival applicants.

Hon. Mr. Foster asked Premier Laurier if he had nothing more to say?

The Premier then explained that the matter had never been brought to his attention. He was sorry Sir Louis Davies was absent, but would consult him.

Mr. Martin said the subject was brought by Senator Ferguson last week in the Senate to the attention of the Minister of Justice and the importance of prompt action had been then pressed upon him.

SUMMER SCHOOL

Of Science—Interesting First Meeting.

A LARGE ATTENDANCE

Enjoyable Excursion, Division of Work—An Illustrated Lecture.

The opening meeting of the Summer School of Science was held on Tuesday evening the 25th inst. The Mayor of the town, Warden of the County, and the representatives in the Local Legislature all spoke hearty words of welcome to which suitable responses were made by several members of the Faculty of the School.

On Wednesday afternoon the first excursion of the School was taken to Mission Point, where the Miamae Indians were celebrating the feast of St. Ann. Wednesday evening was devoted to the discussion of the Natural and General History of the Restigouche. Dr. Bailey discussed the Geology. Mr. Hay the Flora and Scenery and Mr. Montgomery the Historical Incidents of the Restigouche. On Thursday the proposed excursion to the Sugar Loaf had to be postponed on account of the weather.

Thursday evening the School enjoyed a very fine lecture, illustrated with magnificent stereopticon views by Dr. Bailey. The subject of the lecture was The Relation of Geology to History.

The history of the schoolbook which records conquests, kings and revolutions, that which marks the development of a people and that which records the influence of geographical position, mountain systems, rivers, etc. were contrasted and the superiority of the last clearly demonstrated. Would that we had some such history as a text book in our schools. The lecturer then dealt with his special subject and showed how a knowledge of Geology, accounting as it does for the physical features of a country, has a most important bearing upon the history of any country.

A large number of very fine views were projected upon the screen illustrating the mountain ranges, ravines and gorges of the several continents. With one accord the members of the School declared this in itself rewards us for coming to the Summer School.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—(Special).—An outbreak of yellow fever has occurred at the Soldiers' Home, Hampton Va. and is considered serious.

So far there are 34 cases with six deaths.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—(Special).—The United States Hospital ship arrived from Honolulu on the 22nd.

She has on board 300 sick soldiers from Manila and two privates are dead.
