P. E. Island Cattle Win Honours, at First Can. Show

In the list of prizes awarded at the first big live stock show of the year held at Ormatown, Quebec, last week it is pleasing to note that Prince Edward Island bred cattle carried off high honours. In the list are five cattle shown by Raymondale Farms that were purchased last August from Bunbury Farm and Mr. H. J. Kennedy, Tea Hill.

Countess Abbecker Hienke, won two first prizes and the Grand Championship. Abegweit Plura won first prize in the Senior Yearling Class, Abegweit Silver Chaplain won same prize in two year old bulls and Abegweit Maid, won two third prizes. It is reported that Countess Hienke has made a third great record, exceeding 1100 pounds of butter in a year and will qualify in the 10 months division. She is said by some to be the most valuable all round cow in the world today. The owner of Bunbury Farm who received \$2,500 for this cow is now kicking himself for selling her at so low a figure. All the above named are Bunbury Farm products.

In addition to these the four year old cow Jewel Echo Korndyke bred and sold by W. H. J. Kennedy won a second prize.

This is certainly a splendid record for Prince Edward Island's first carload shipment of cattle and will do much to place Prince Edward Island on the live stock map.
