IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN LAWLER

His many friends in city and country were deeply shocked to learn of the death at the City Hospital on Saturday, December 22nd, of John Lawler at the early age of 56 years.

The deceased who was well and favorably known in Charlottetown had been enjoying robust health until about a month ago when he contracted blood poisoning in the leg. He was confined to his home for two weeks after which he was removed to the City Hospital. Here he was given the best medical and nursing attention, but the disease had already advanced too far and his condition gradually became worse. Both doctors and nurses made the most strenuous efforts to hold together the thread of life. Providence however deemed otherwise and the end came on the above date.

The late Mr. Lawler who possessed a very genial and cheerful disposition had a large circle of friends and had that rare characteristic by which he was capable of spreading the spirit of friendship wherever he went.

The deceased was attended during his illness by Rev. Father McLintyre and Father McMillan and received the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church of which he was a devout member.

There are left to mourn their loss besides a sorrowing widow, four sons Frank and William at home; Frederick in Montreal and Percy in Northern Ontario, two daughters Bertha and Florence; also four brothers James and Joseph of this city; Edward in Halifax; William, Cambridge, Mass., and one sister Mrs. William Brennan of this city to whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

The funeral will take place from his late residence, 280 Euston St., Tuesday, (Christmas Day) at 2.30 p. m. to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, thence to R. C. Cemetery.
