DEBATE CONTINUED IN PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

Mr. Peter Brodie Didn't Have any Bonquets to Throw at the Technical School or the Road Policy; and Consequently Did Not Get Any Applause From the Liberal Benches. Mr. Adrian Arsenault Followed in a Brilliant and Able Speech. Mr. D. C. McDonald Adjourned the Debate.

The House met at 3:40 p.m. Premier Bell gave notice that he would move, seconded by Hon. Mr. Crosby, that legislation be enacted to give the Provincial Government the necessary authority to construct and maintain improved highways through and along such streets of Charlottetown, Summerside and other incorporated towns and villages within the Province, as may be necessary for the provisions of the Canada Highways Act, for the completion and extension of the improved highways to the depots, wharves and other shipping points.

Penny Postal Rate May Again Return

LONDON, Mar. 26.—Sir Adolph Tuck, head of the deputation of post card manufacturers, which waited on the Postmaster General, Sir W. Jeynes-Hicks today, urged a reversion to the half penny postage on post cards. The deputation pointed out that the post card had diminished by half compared with the trade in 1914.

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Peter the Great Famous Racer Dead

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Mar. 26.—Peter the Great, famous racing sire of the stable of Stoughton A. Fletcher, died here today, following a stroke of paralysis. One of the greatest money earners on the track during his racing career, the famous trotter, which held a mark of 2:07 3/4 was retired several years ago by Fletcher. Peter the Great sired 549 standard track performers, which is said to be more than twice the number sired by any other racing sire.

Y. M. C. A. Work In Mission Fields Told by Mr. Scott

Mr. Ralph Scott, secretary of the Y. M. C. A. of St. Charles, Ill., gave a very interesting address on his experiences in South America at St. Paul's Church last night. He first spoke of his duties at Montevideo Uruguay six years ago. He gave a detailed account of the big business man who met him and gave him his hearty support to the first Y. M. C. A. secretary.

Revise Salaries To Meet Increase In Cost of Living

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Mar. 26.—A. C. Campbell, the president of the Canadian Civil Service Association before the House Committee on Civil Service Act said that to meet the increasing cost of living, permanent salaries to government employees should be revised to meet the increase.

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(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Mar. 26.—The League of Nations is gathering opinions from its members on the Canadian proposal for an amendment to article ten of the covenant by which they undertake to preserve against external aggression the territorial integrity and political independence of each other. Observations must be communicated before June 1st after which the council will take up the matter.
