The principal increases in imports were in foodstuffs, raw material and manufactured goods, but the value of American cotton decreased \$10,000,000.

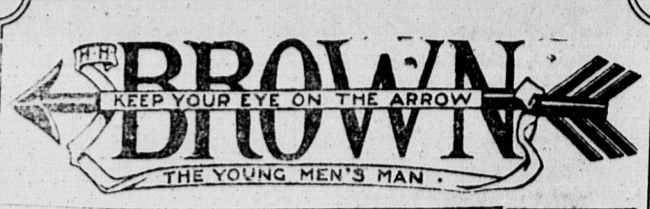
The main increase in exports was in manufactured goods, of which cotton fabrics showed a gain of \$7,500,000.

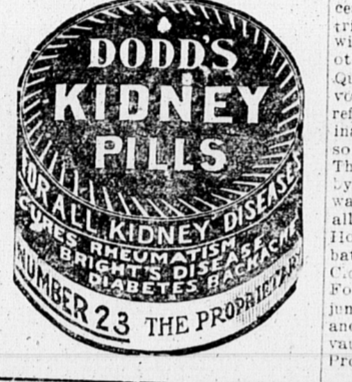

ASSALY SUICIDES IN PENITENTIARY

KINGSTON, Ont., Jan. 13.—An Assyrian named Salem Assaley, sent to the penitentiary for murder, hanged himself in his cell last night, using his bed-clothing to do the deed. He tied the sheet to his cell door and was found dead by a guard on one of his rounds.

Assaly was the man who murdered his brother at Hawkesbury last winter and in making his escape was so badly frozen that his feet had to be amputated. He was sent to the penitentiary a short time ago, after his sentence of death was commuted to life imprisonment. He was thirty years of age.

OCEAN STEAMERS PUT UP PASSENGER RATE

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 13.—The Atlantic steamship companies today agreed to advance in west bound passenger rates of at least five per cent.

RECORD OF MOUNTED POLICE.

OTTAWA, Jan. 14.—The record of the "Riders of the Plains" for the past year was presented to Parliament by Sir Wilfrid Laurier as the official head of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police.

It shows that in September the strength of the force was 51 officers and 600 men, a gain of two constables during the year, 240 are stationed in Alberta, 306 in Saskatchewan, 74 in the Yukon and 31 in the Territories.

The farthest north detachment is on Arctic ice, 2,500 miles from headquarters, and takes two months to make the journey.

INCREASE IN PAST YEAR.

OTTAWA, Jan. 14.—This year's volume of railway statistics shows that the mileage of Canadian railways in June last was 24,104, an increase in the year of 1,138.

About 3,200 miles are in progress of construction. The increase in second tracking was 253 and in yard and siding tracks 215 miles.

Canada has 0.6 miles per 100 square miles and 300 inhabitants per mile of line. This is the largest mileage in proportion to population and the smallest in relation to area in the world.

END OF BIG STRIKE.

HALIFAX, Jan. 14.—The bitter struggle between the Dominion Coal Company and the U.M.W. is at an end.

President Plummer intends to recognize all the miners irrespective of organization, and the strikers are willing to go back to the pits.

The soldiers who have been in the colliery districts since July, will return next week to Halifax.

CALAMITY AT SEA.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Jan. 14.—Harry Kentzell, First Assistant Engineer, is sole survivor of the wreck of the steamer Charina. He rode but futile efforts were made by life-saving crew and citizens to help the doomed ship's company, several of whom clung to the rigging all night hoping for help only to have three fall one after another into the sea which soon after closed over three others who had jumped voluntarily.
