Teachers' Study Group At O'Leary

The second meeting of the re-organized Study Group was held in O'Leary School, May 14th. The following teachers were present: Earle Jelly, Lewis MacKenzie, Mrs. Jack Mathews, Mrs. Albert MacIsaac, Mrs. Raynall MacNeill, Lily Wood, Weldon Mathews, Jack Arbing, Mrs. Keith MacDougall, Mrs. Frank Stewart, Mrs. Ira MacDonald, Mary Locke and Betty Thompson.

The question of whether or not the Grade VIII standard tests should be continued was then discussed. The general opinion of the teachers was that some form of standardized tests should be continued. It was suggested that standard tests or tests of the same principle be used for grades six and seven or even as low as grade five.

The teachers agreed that the reason why so many teachers move from school to school was the result of several factors such as: (1) inconvenient and poor boarding accommodations; (2) lack of equipment; (3) lack of co-operation from one or more parents.

The Code of Ethics was read by Mr. Weldon Mathews and comments showed that the majority of teachers live up to the code.

Mr. Callaghan urged that all reports be sent promptly, as delay causes more unnecessary work for inspectors and those at the Department of Education.

It was learned that the Moyer School Supplies would not delay orders if they received them early enough. It would be a good idea if teachers who need supplies at the beginning of the new school year, to send their orders in June. Then, when school re-opened the supplies would be ready. Mr. McKenzie suggested that at the end of the school year, the teacher should make out a list of required work-books and supplies and give it to the school board. Then when the new teacher was hired the list would be handed her and she could order the required material immediately.

The next topic discussed was the Improvement Plan in schools. In building a new school the government grants \$500 for a one-room school and \$250 for each additional room. For making improvements in a school the government will grant the maximum sum of \$300. Other individual matters were discussed and the meeting was then adjourned.

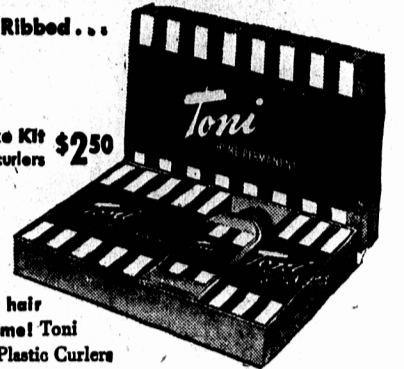
