HOME FROM OVERSEAS—Dr. W. Fred Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Taylor, of this city, has arrived home from England accompanied by Mrs. Taylor, a London lady to whom he was married a year ago. Dr. Taylor has been away for nearly five years, having proceeded to England in the early part of the war. He went to France with the Fifth Ambulance and was at the Somme during the terrific fighting there. He later transferred to the 28th Battalion of Western Canada as Medical Officer, where he saw a great deal of service in that capacity. He was next with No. 2 Canadian Stationary Hospital at Outreau and remained until after the signing of the armistice. He then returned to England and became attached to the Royal Air Force, and in August last transferred to the Canadian Air Force in England. The force is now being demobilized and a few that are left in England are coming to Canada to join the Canadian Air Board camps in connection with which they are being established in Western Canada. Camp Borden and other points. Dr. Taylor has had a wonderful experience overseas and in his capacity as a medical officer had many opportunities of getting in close contact with the Boches and ascertaining the character of the people they are fighting. Dr. Taylor and Mrs. Taylor intend remaining here for the summer, and will be cordially welcomed.

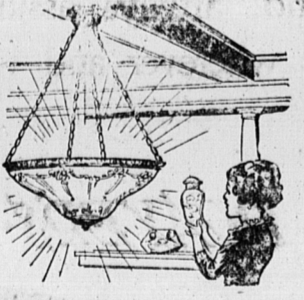

SUFFOLK COUNTY POTATO INSPECTION TRIP AND AUTO TOUR, JULY 12 AND 13. FARMERS PLAN BIG EVENT. MANY VISITORS EXPECTED.

Committee of Suffolk County, N. B. farmers are laying plans for the State Inspection Trip and Auto Tour which will be held on Monday, July 12 and Tuesday, July 13. Suffolk County extends a cordial invitation especially to Canada. Suffolk County offers one of the finest of markets for seed potatoes. A large proportion of the seed used for the potato crop is grown outside the county. It is in the interest of better seed and progress in potato production that this inspection trip is being planned.

One of the principal features of the trip will be a visit to the potato seed source tests where field meetings will be held, and a study made of the various lots of seed as they grow side by side in the field. The Green Mountain seed source tests are located on the farms of Henry J. Reeve, Mattituck, and Morgan Topping, Bridgehampton, both in the centre of Suffolk County's two largest potato growing sections. There are 56 different lots of Green Mountain seed in the tests including 25 lots from various sections of New York State, 18 lots from Vermont, 17 lots from Maine, and 6 lots from Canada. The Cobble seed source tests are located on the farms of Fred Tabor, Orient, and Henry J. Reeve, Mattituck, and include seed from the following sources: Maine 11, Vermont 6, New York, 2, Can
