The bride was the recipient of a number of useful and ornamental presents.

DONALD McNeil, a Prince Edward Island man committed suicide in Haverhill, Mass. on Wednesday by drinking carbolic acid. His wife knocked the bottle from his hand, but was too late, as her husband had swallowed a quantity of the drug. During the struggle Mrs. McNeil was somewhat burned by the acid. Previous to this act he told his wife of his intention, and gave her his watch to send to his father. It is supposed the man had been drinking. He had been employed in a shoe factory.

SEA VIEW.—Our school is progressing favorably under the able management of Miss Nellie Nicholson, Principal, and Miss Flossie Williams assistant. Although the mumps have been raging during the past two or three months among the scholars, the average has been well up to the standard.—On Monday evening last quite a number of young people of this vicinity took advantage of the last good sleighing of the season, and drove to the home of Wm. Cousins, Baltic, where they spent a very pleasant evening.—Our local sportsman, H. M. Campbell, is making extensive preparations for the coming season's lobster fishing. He has purchased a large quantity of fishing supplies from Messrs. P. McNutt & Son.

The inquest into the death of John McLaughlin who was found at his house, Kent Street, as reported in The Guardian, took place Saturday morning in Prosecutor Jenkins' office before Coroner MacNeill and the following jury: Frank Bradley, John Dalziel, Dominick Macdonald, Edward Halloran, John Harris, Arthur Vatcher, Robert Jenkins and George Scott'sbury. James Trainor, a fellow workman, Martin Murray, Sergeants Bradley and Doyle, Officer Carter and Dr. McLaughlin were examined. The jury after deliberation returned the following verdict: The deceased came to his death on the night of the 10th by alcoholic poisoning brought on by excessive drinking.

All know who have followed even in a cursory manner the newspapers of P. E. Island, that there is great complaint on that Island over the poor cable service between the mainland and the "gem of the Gulf." No wires can be received in Charlottetown, nor any other part of P. E. Island, after 8 o'clock in the evening, nor from Saturday night until Monday morning. The Islanders contend that this is in direct violation of one of the terms of agreement under which they entered the Canadian Confederation. An influential delegation is now about starting from Charlottetown to Ottawa to put this matter, this gross injustice in telegraph service, to P. E. Island fairly before the Dominion Government. This Delegation has the support of the Boards of Trade of the Maritime Provinces. The Council of the Truro Board was called to gether last night, and after a short discussion, on motion of Mr. C. E. Beasley, passed unanimously the following Resolution: Whereas—The telegraph service between P. E. Island and Nova Scotia is most unsatisfactory, causing serious loss and inconvenience to business men, and whereas—The Government of P. E. Island and the Board of Trade of Charlottetown, are sending a joint delegation to Ottawa to press the matter upon the Federal Government, therefore resolved this Council of the Board of Trade strongly endorse the efforts of this Delegation, and trust that the grievances so long existing, will be at once remedied. Copies of this will be sent by Secretary Hall, to Ottawa, Charlottetown and to other places interested in this important question. As a business matter it is all important that our Boards of Trade should strengthen the hands of the Delegation, as the Truro Board has done in every way possible.—Truro News.

COMMENTING We Tuesday April 15th, a change of the time table will come into effect on the P. E. Island Railway. Through connection is made from the east to the west and from the west to the east by the morning train which will be found very convenient.

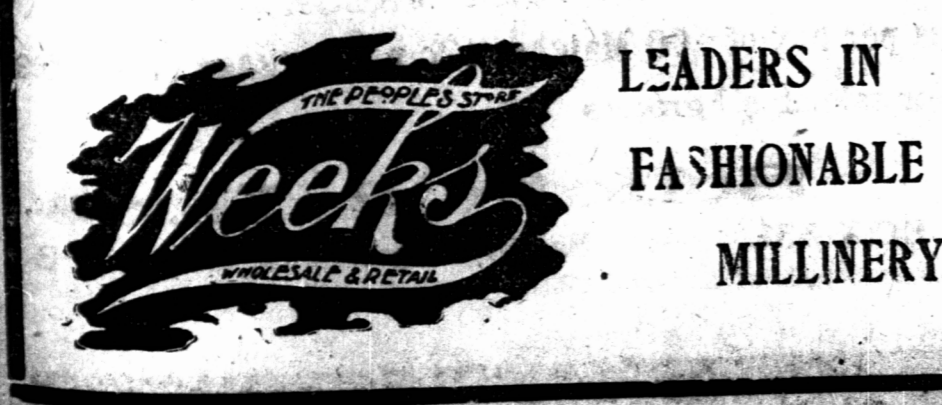
