A SPLENDID TRIBUTE

The following splendid tribute from Doctor Andrew MacPhail, who is so eminently fitted to judge character, to the late Lieutenant Spurgeon MacKenzie, fully sizes up the life and qualities of this gallant young officer. Here is the letter from the doctor to Mr. Justice Fitzgerald:
B. E. F., 18th May, 1917.
Dear Fitzgerald,—
I have to say that my young friend Lieutenant C. S. MacKenzie is killed. I have no further particulars, as he was not at the time in my division. For nearly two years he was in my company and I came to know him well as one gets to know a man at the front. He was a good soldier, and that means he was good in every sense, honest, faithful, diligent, patient, trustworthy, brave. By men and officers he was respected and beloved. Since he took a commission I have not seen much of him, but I hear that he continued to display those qualities which endeared him to us. He had a happy life; now he has an honorable death. There is nothing to lament. In this war especially one is inclined to say "Blessed are the dead." As I write I am reminded that the first day I went in the trenches, it was he who was with me. I hope when you see his people you will assure them of my sympathy.
