### RAIN RUINS OPENER IN WASHINGTON

(By Alan Gould Associated Press Sports Editor by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 16—Subject to the caprice of spring weather, which ruined today's game opening scheduled in the United States capital, Major League baseball will put on its eight-night show tomorrow, hopeful of bigger and better things for the 50th organized season of the great American sport.

After two of the most financially disastrous years in the history of professional baseball, accompanied by graver problems than any since the costly Federal League war 20 years ago, all 16 big league clubs have been strengthened for the combined purpose of tightening the pennant races and recapturing public support.

Sweeping changes have been effected. Since last spring eight new managers have been named; two tail-end clubs have been pulled out of desperate straits by wealthy new owners. Sunday baseball has been instituted in Pennsylvania, a standard ball adopted for both big leagues and Connie Mack sold all his championship stars to rival teams with the exception of Jimmie Fox. The influence of these and other factors calculated to stimulate interest is expected to attract approximately 185,000 fans through the turnstiles tomorrow—weather permitting. It was stormy tonight all along the northeastern seaboard but clear skies were forecast around New York by game-time and the situation appeared doubtful only in Boston, where the Red Sox hoped to entertain the champion Washington Senators after being washed out in the Capital today. Fair weather prevailed in the west.

### Tigers Give Que.-Ont. Champs Hard Battle In Opener

Speed Of Quebec Team Is Deciding Factor As Maritime Titlists Lose 37-35

Bauld) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) (C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 16—Montreal Nationale, winner of the Ontario-Quebec basketball title, won the first of a best-two-out-of-three series for the Eastern Canadian senior basketball crown tonight, defeating Dalhousie University Tigers 37-35.

Playing a fast-breaking offensive type of ball, the Nationale fairly dominated the contest with their speed and fast passing. The Dalhousie boys, who played a delayed attack, scored on long shots from outside the penalty line. Montreal's defense was too strong for them to do much close-in shooting.

Playing a man-to-man game both teams had many penalties called against them, and whereas the Quebec team capitalized on their opportunities, Halifax squad missed a good percentage of their free throws.

Led by Murray Patrick of last year's title holders, the Victoria Blue Ribbons, and Pat Griffin, who is playing in senior games for the first time this year, the Nationale continually left the Tigers up the floor and scored on set-ups.

Murray Patrick was the outstanding player on the floor and after he was banished in the second period for four personal fouls, his team resorted to shelling and simply controlling the ball, scoring only when they had perfect opportunities. Patrick collected 11 points before he retired to the bench.

Pat Griffin, Nationale's 6 foot 3 inch centre, played a great combination game and added 10 points to his team's total.

Ralston, of Dalhousie, was on the end of most of their plays but should have scored more. Gladstone, Tigers' lanky centre pushed the ball through the hoop for nine

points, and Musgrove scored eight. The Halifax team was nervous and excited during the whole game and this resulted in many lost opportunities. Coach Jack Thomas said he thinks his boys will do better in the second game because most of their tension will be dropped.

Eddie Gronau, who has been coaching winners since he retired from the game eight years ago, is confident his team will play a better game tomorrow night, after getting accustomed to the floor and baskets.

"You boys certainly had some horse-shoes around your necks tonight," he said as he entered the Nationale's dressing-room after the game.

The winner of this series will enter the final round of the Canadian senior basketball championship.

### AUREL JOLIAT AWARDED HART TROPHY

Peters) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) (C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, April 16.—The wraith-like figure of Aurel Joliat, battling year after year against keen competition and advancing age, demanded and received recognition this year from the sports writers' announcement of the National Hockey League circuit.

Second oldest player in the League in point of service, and crowning his long career with a remarkable performance in the 1933-34 campaign just closed, Joliat, left winger of Montreal Canadiens, has been voted the most useful player to his club and awarded the prized Hart Trophy.

Again regarded by sports writers as the player who best advances clean conduct with effective hockey, Frank Boucher, perennial centre of New York Rangers, was awarded the Lady Byng Trophy for his sixth year. Announcement of these awards, made by President Frank Calder tonight, concluded the individual trophy winning of the League this year in a clean sweep of veterans over a younger generation. Charlie Gardiner, goal tender of the Stanley Cup holders, Chicago Black Hawks, secured the Georges Vezina Trophy as the League's best goalie.

"Big Train" in Running While Joliat was the pick of the sports writers he was not without competition. Big Lionel Conacher, defensive bulwark of the Hawks, around whose bulky figure Tommy Gorman built up strategy which resulted in the Stanley Cup going to the western United States city for the first time in history, ran Aurel a close race. Joliat secured 62 points in the voting against 56 for the "Big Train".

Clancy, dynamo of the powerful Toronto Maple Leafs, secured 51 votes and Earl Selbert, the vastly improved defenceman of New York Rangers followed with 32. It is notable that of the four granted recognition by the writers, three are high-scoring defencemen.

Boucher and Joe Primeau, Leafs' centre, waged a close fight for the Byng Trophy. Boucher getting 76 Byng votes and Primeau getting 72 for the Leaf. Ralph "Cooney" Welland, who started the season with Ottawa but behind in a bid to glory with Detroit was third, but a considerable distance back. Johnny Gottselig, Hawks, was fourth.

### ALONG THE SPORT TRAIL

Carrying a distinct threat to the Quebec-Ontario champions, Dalhousie Tigers, Mar time basketball titlists dropped a close decision to Montreal Nationale last night in the Garrison City.

From reports of the game nervousness on the part of the Halifax team played an important part in their setback, causing them to miss many scoring opportunities.

But now that the Tigers have recovered from their stage-fright they should give the Nationale plenty to worry over in the final game as the teams fight for the right to enter the finals.

Saint John Tramps, intermediate titleholders, dropped an even closer decision losing by a solitary point to Montreal Y. M. H. A., their stirring finish having the Quebec champs on the run.

A classy display of silver trophies is to be seen in the Holy Name Club these days, the cups being for the winners of the various bowling leagues and billiard tournament.

Enclosed in a glass, push-lined case the trophies, 22 in all, present a striking appearance, the largest being 16 inches high mounted on a long base.
