Seedmen to the People of P. E. I.

Archdeacon Watson Addresses Diocesan Church Society

The following is a brief synopsis of an address given by Archdeacon Watson at the annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society last Wednesday night.

Having been invited to speak on the subject of Diocesan Finances, after expressing his appreciation of the kind invitation of the D. C. S. and the pleasure it afforded him to meet so many old friends. The speaker proceeded to define the terms "Diocese" and "Finance."

He pointed out that a diocese is the area or territory placed under the jurisdiction and oversight of a bishop, and that we had the distinction of being part of the very first overseas diocese of the church of England to be founded. When the Diocese or See of Nova Scotia was first established it embraced all British North America, including Bermuda and Newfoundland. By degrees new dioceses were carved out of the original one, which now embraced only the Provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

It was sometimes thought that P. E. I. was not really a part of the diocese of Nova Scotia, but the speaker showed that it was so, by the history of the See, by the fact that P. E. I. representatives and clergy sit and vote in the synod of the Diocese and also by the deliberate act and request of the Church people of P. E. I. In this connection an interesting resolution passed by the D. C. S. in 1894 was read by the secretary from the minute book in his care.

The speaker then stressed the point that since all were represented in the Synod, all were bound by its decisions, which were in fact their own; and that all were in duty bound to obey and honor the decisions of the Synod.

The speaker then showed what the meaning of the word "finance" was in this connection and pointed out that no request for money could be made, no financial obligation incurred except by the action and vote of the Synod, either directly or through its responsible committees.

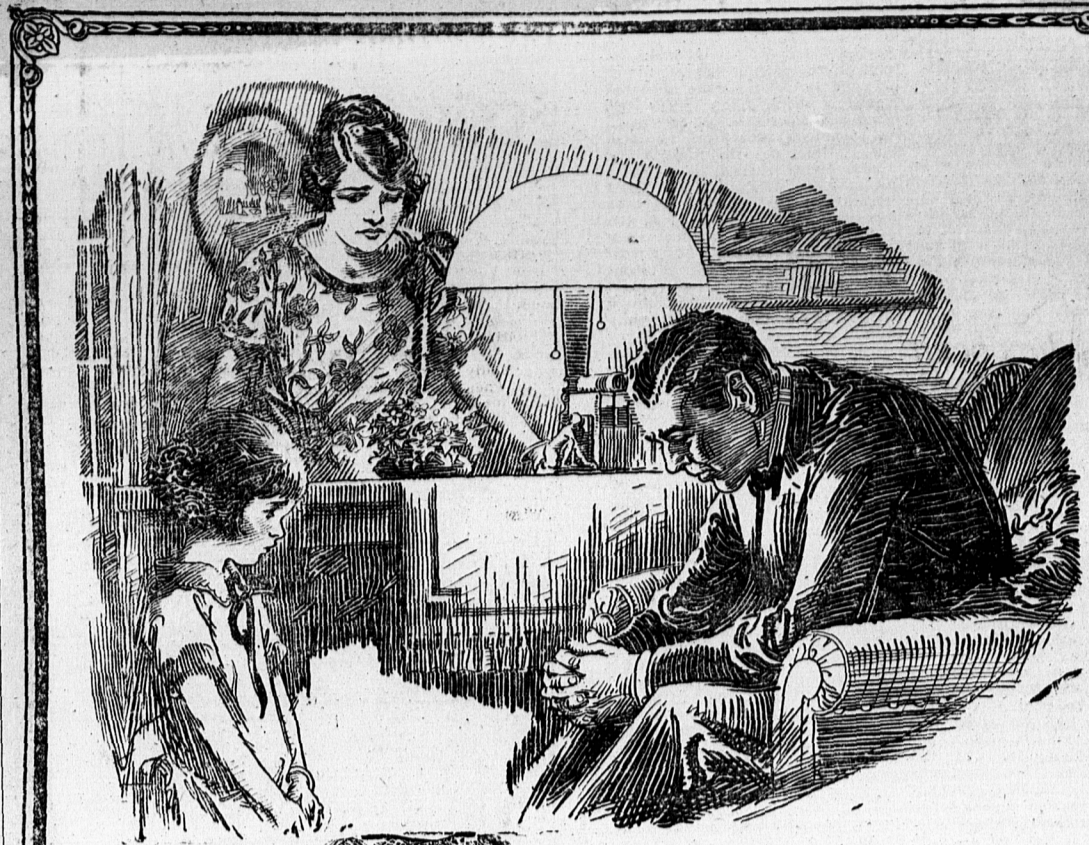
Similarly no money could be paid out of any Diocesan fund except by the authority of a definite vote of the Synod.

In other words, no work can be undertaken, no responsibility incurred, no assessment or apportionment made, no money expended except by the free action of the church people themselves acting through their church representatives, which action every member of the church was bound to support according to his ability.

The speaker next explained the various enterprises and activities of the Church and the funds in connection with each emphasizing particularly the missionary, educational, social, and beneficiary work undertaken, and the expenses of each department. How the estimates were made up, and finally how the whole sum required was apportioned to the parishes, so that every parish was informed as to its own fair share of the common burden.

In this connection he stressed the need for full and accurate reports and statistics from each parish in order that the committee in charge of this department may have the information necessary to guide them to a wise and equitable apportionment, giving to each parish its own fair amount and no more.

In conclusion the speaker pointed out the financial and the spiritual sides of the Church's work, showed that at bottom our financial problems were really spiritual ones, and that those whose hearts were on fire with the love of God and of His Cause, seldom failed to do their full duty in this matter, but readily confessed that they found joy and pleasure in giving to His cause, and that the blessing of God always rewarded their efforts for the strengthening and extending of His Kingdom.

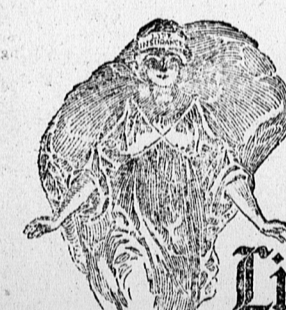

Mr. Hyndman wired F. Price of the Car Service Department, C. N. R., Montreal and received from him the following reply: "I desire to assure you that the situation is receiving our best attention. Refrigerator cars are moving east from Montreal as well as other directions to the Island and expect to get sufficient over there to protect your requirements."

At present 200 refrigerators are required immediately. Telegraphed Car Service Department, Montreal and received their reply 14th assuring that sufficient cars would be supplied to protect our requirements. Telegraphed them again last night (14th) should have 100 refrigerators on Island within 24 hours and balance this week otherwise very serious for shippers. Thought you would appreciate particulars of present situation."
