Judge's Remarks: The Wheat was above the average. There were a few exceptionally good fields. White Russian was the favorite variety. The oats, however, were below the average, being thin and short and lacking in uniformity. Old Island Black is still a favorite variety. Many fields of wheat showed evidence of insect injury caused probably by the Wheat Stem Saw Fly.

MIDDLE PRINCE

The oats were a little below the average with a few exceptionally good fields. Banner is the favorite variety in this district. The Wheat was not very good as it lacked in stand and a number of fields contained noxious weeds. Insect injury similar to that of West Prince was also in evidence.

BOSTON HERALD TO BE SOLD OUT.

BOSTON, Sept. 14.—The property of Boston Herald incorporated publishers of the Boston Herald and the Boston Travellers, was sold at auction for \$1,800,000 today to F. D. Sullivan of New York, representing Morton F. Plant and other holders of securities of Boston Herald incorporated. Several weeks ago advertisements in the Newspapers announced that the property for the Boston publishing Company, a corporation organized by him and his associates to continue the publication of the papers. R. L. O'Brien elected President of the new company will remain in direction of the editorial and news policy of the papers. The operating staff will be unchanged.

In the midst of his reform programme the cry rang out, "Returns from Caledonia!" Silence was called for and the silence and the figures came together. When the silence came Mr Nash's hand was still in the air, as was also his hat which had been doing the gesticulating for him. He did not bring either down, and when the figures were announced, which put him in a minority by eighteen votes, the hat and the hand and Mr Nash came down together in a heap like this.

KING GEORGE AND CZAR EXCHANGE MESSAGES

LONDON, Sept. 16.—King George has received the following telegram from the Czar of Russia: "In this serious time which my country is going through I have decided to take the leadership of my armies into my own hands. In announcing to you this fact I once more express my conviction that with God's help and through the combined efforts of the allies their final victory will crown this bloody war."

NO NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN FOR COUPLE OF WEEKS BERNSTORFF SAYS.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—There will be no developments in the situation as regards the United States and Germany for at least two weeks, Count Von Bernstorff said to newspaper men today in reply to requests for a statement on his arrival here from Washington.

"You know," he said, "that I never see or talk to newspaper men. Any how, I will state this much. There will be no developments in the situation on which you seek light for at least two weeks. The negotiations are now going on and it will take at least a fortnight for anything less hypocrisy into your temperance finite to be stated."
