CLARK, Bay View, sends an extract from a Saginaw, Michigan, paper which her Aunt Jane McKenzie sent her saying, her son's (Willam McKenzie) wife had passed away on the first of October in the Hospital after an operation. When Mr. and Mrs. Clark visited them the first week in August last, she was the first one in the family whom they met and she was very kind; first taking them to see her own mother, then to see her husband's mother, afterwards joining in a family reunion the last evening they spent in Saginaw, apparently in the best of health. The extract is dated Saginaw, Oct 1st, and is as follows:—"Ella A., beloved wife of William C. McKenzie, died last night at 10.45 at the Woman's hospital where she had undergone an operation, Wednesday, from which she had not sufficient strength to rally. The deceased was born at Tawas City, Aug. 16, 1868, and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Isalah Currie. She came to this city with them at the age of 15. June 10, 1893, she was married to Mr. McKenzie and has lived in Saginaw since. Besides her husband one son survives her. She had many friends who deeply mourn her early demise and who have only good to say of her life and character. The remains were removed to the residence, 117 North Baum Street, whence they were taken to Tawas City for burial, after a brief service conducted by Rev. Andrew B. Chalmers.—Com.
