N. Y. Financial Markets Continue To Press Forward

NEW YORK, July 6—(AP)—Financial markets continued to press forward last week while the lengthy advance inspired a certain amount of profit selling. It was well absorbed. The share division, Thursday recorded its seventh successive average upswing.
All securities exchanges recessed Friday for the United States Independence Day holiday and observed the usual Saturday suspensions.
Throughout the week stocks were benefited by rising business optimism, hopes for a quick settlement of the coal controversy and brightening chances for a tax relief bill and relief that the odds were for a normal summer rally. The market has moved up in the majority of Julys over the last 50 years.
Earnings and dividends were helpful. Oils touched peaks for the year or longer in almost every session as growing fuel shortages highlighted this group. Ralls came to the fore on the outlook for favorable reorganization legislation in addition to prospects of boosted freight and passenger charges.
The Associated Press 60-stock composite showed a net gain of two points on the week at 66.1, best level since March 6. From the low of last May 17, a bottom since Jan. 26, 1945, the index was up 7.6 points, or roughly \$7,600,000,000 for the four days was 4,191,355 shares compared with the previous five-day aggregate of 4,336,610.
The list edged forward Monday on only \$70,000 shares with steel packing the upturn despite the sharpest drop of the year in mill operations due to slackening coal supplies. The market ended June with an average advance of three full points after four successive losing months. Turnover for the month, however, dwindled to 17,482,740 shares, lowest for any month since September 1944.

United States Steel Industry Received Sharp Set-back

CLEVELAND, July 6—(AP)—Efforts of the United States steel industry to bring supply into balance with demand received a sharp setback last week when a combination of adverse factors cut the national output rate 23 1-2 points to 73 per cent of capacity, the magazine Steel reported today.
Curtailment of production was primarily in open hearth and blast furnace departments, the journal said.
The decline in ingot production was due to the stoppage of coal shipments from the vacation-closed mines and to shutdowns of steel mills for the July 4 and vacation holidays, Steel said.
Suspension of coal mining affected principally those mills located close to the coal fields and which depend largely on mine-to-mill shipments.
This is indicated in the following changes in operations in the various districts: declines of 53 points at Youngstown to 40 per cent, 42 at Pittsburgh to 42 per cent and 30 1-2 at Wheeling to 63 per cent.
The situation was unique in Detroit where operations rose four points to 92 per cent.

Legal Battle Over Criminal Code Amendments

OTTAWA, July 3—(CP)—Long drawn-out legal argument developed in the Commons tonight over fast-tracking Government legislation providing indefinite imprisonment for habitual criminals, although the principle of the provision was approved.
With amendments to the Criminal Code before the House, it was a legal field day as lawyer-members of both sides of the Commons quoted chapter and verse of the Code across the floor and confronted each other with intricate legal arguments to support their varying contentions.
Sitting as an unofficial judge over the display of legal talent was Justice Minister Ilsley also a lawyer, to whom fell the delicate task of determining whether the arguments advanced were strong enough to warrant the changing of the legislation.
The measure later given third and final reading, closely patterned to similar United States legislation, will mean that indefinite imprisonment could be decreed for persons convicted three times of offences carrying with them duration of at least five years.
John Diefenbaker (PC—Lake Centre) an able defence lawyer in private life, approved the legislation but expressed belief more attention should be given to reformation of criminals.
The bill also tightens sections of the Code dealing with motor accidents and the possession of weapons. Increases penalties for operation of common bawdy houses, places death from "indirect assault" in the classification of "murder" and adds the imitation of an offensive weapon to the list of such weapons.
Justice Minister Ilsley told the House the Government was seeking means of dealing with the increasing number of sexual criminals but found that this was a field in which there was "much disagreement" as to what steps could be taken.

Blame Sinking On Ship's Mate

TORONTO, July 3—(CP)—Responsibility for the Lake Superior tragedy which claimed 12 lives in the early hours of June 4 when the Canada Steamship Lines freighter sank off Isle Royale was placed today on one of its victims as the inquiry into the accident drew abruptly to a close.
After arguments by counsel, Mr. Justice F. H. Barrow called an adjournment, saying that unless he and the assessors found it necessary to reconvene the court, a report of the proceedings would be sent to Transport Minister Cheverie who ordered the inquiry July 18.
With apparent reluctance, Hugh Plaxton of Toronto, counsel for the Transport Department, set blame for the disaster on James A. Morrey, missing first mate of Kingston, Ont., on what he described as "strong evidence" which could not be controverted. Morrey had spent most of the fatal trip in his chair either dozing or asleep.
Mr. Plaxton said he could find nothing to support criticism of the action of Captain Eidon Walkinshaw of Collingwood, who went down with his ship.

STOCKHOLM—(CP)—An American observation balloon was discovered in a forest here. The pilot message announced the balloon had been released from the continental United States Sept. 22, 1944, and requested that the finder notify the nearest American consulate.

BOAR BONUS POLICY

1. The following bonus will be paid on bacon type boars which are in active service at time of inspection.
Boar from dams qualified in Advanced Registry:
Class A \$12.00
Class B 8.00
Boar from dams not qualified in Advanced Registry:
Class A \$9.00
Class B 6.00
2. All boars must be in breeding condition, sound and serviceable.
3. A Class "A" boar is one which in the opinion of the Inspector is good enough to sire registered breeding stock.
4. A Class "B" boar is one which although useful as a sire of commercial market hogs may carry slightly objectionable features of conformation.
5. Boars must be registered and transferred to the party making application for inspection.
6. REGISTRATION CERTIFICATE MUST BE AVAILABLE TO THE INSPECTOR AT TIME OF INSPECTION.
7. Any boar showing evidence of hog lice at time of inspection will not be eligible for a bonus.
8. No boar shall receive inspection under 7 months of age.
9. No boar shall pass inspection unless he is kept in sanitary and reasonable clean quarters. Preference will be given to boars which are on pasture at time of inspection.
10. All reports of Boar Inspection shall be submitted for final approval to a Board composed of three members of the Federal and Provincial Department of Agriculture and approved by the Minister of Agriculture.
11. In cases where boars have been purchased by Farmers' Institutes or other similar organizations which have received a grant to assist in such purchase, no bonus will be paid on such boars in any year in which such grants have been paid.
12. All applications for inspection must be made on the forms supplied by the Provincial Department of Agriculture. All registered boars are eligible.
13. Applications will be received up to August 31st. Inspection may be made any time before October 31st.
