REVELSTOCK, B. C. April 10th.—Dial closed today with C. P. R. whereby that Company obtains an interest in the Trout Lake townsite. The Company agree this summer to build a wharf and slip at Trout Lake, also to erect a station and warehouse and to place a steamer on the lake. Engineer Sullivan and party will be in Trout Lake just as soon as the ice is clear of the lake to look after all preliminaries for carrying out the C. P. R.'s side of the agreement. Your correspondent was informed that if the Provincial Government can be prevailed upon to meet the C. P. R. half way, with regard to expenditure, they are willing to undertake work of lowering the lake.
