Berne Hears Nazis Admit Heavy Losses

BERNE, March 8—(AP)—Official Berlin circles acknowledged total losses of 1,500,000 German soldiers in the Russian campaign but describe these losses as "absolutely bearable," a Berlin dispatch to the Berne newspaper Der Bund said today.

SUCCESSFUL BLACKOUTS

The first blackout of the Cape Peninsula, South Africa, brought all-round co-operation in all areas.

The Associated Press 40-stock average ended unchanged from Saturday at 35.2. It was the slowest session since last June 30 with volume at 308,905 shares against 641,400 last Friday.

TORONTO, March 9—(CP)—The stock market slipped into another steady decline today and the close was at low for the session. Three groups, the industrials, the base metals and the western oils, closed at new low levels for the year.

Turnover was small at 67,000 shares which was 20,000 shares under last week's average.

McIntyre came out at 39 for a loss of 3-4, trading 400 shares and Buffalo-Ankerite was down 25 cents to 2.25. Kerr-Addison weakened 10 cents to 3.45 and net declines of 3 cents were showing finally for Anur, Broulan, East Malartic, Preston and Teck Hughes. San Antonio advanced 7 to 1.70 and smaller gains were held by Beattie Gold, Chesterville, Cochranour Williams and Reno. Other senior golds were unchanged.

International Nickel was the most active of the higher-price base metals, and it weakened 1-2 to 32, the low mark for the year. Sherritt weakened 3 cents and Smelters firmed a minor fraction.

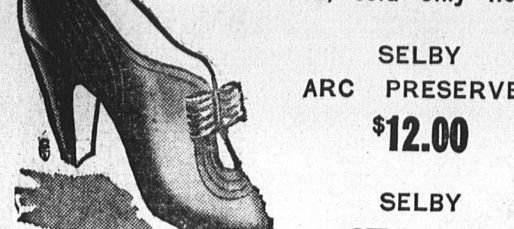
A few of the higher-price industrials were in the heavy list. Canada Bread weakened 4 points to 41, Simpson's A was off 2 1-2 to 5 and losses of a point or more were noted by Distillers-Seagrams, Walkers common, Canadian Celanese pfd, Canadian General Electric, Goodyear Tire pfd, Moore Corporation and Consumers Gas.

Senior oils held steady and scattered gains included Canada Steamship pfd, Dominion Stores, Ford A, National Grocers and Page-Hersey.

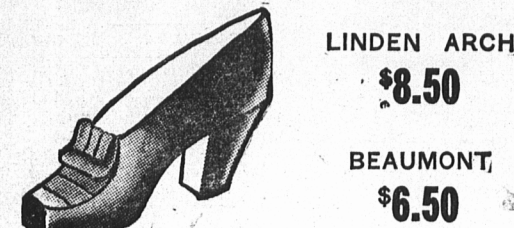
Home Oil weakened 4 cents to 1.36 and insignificant losses came out for Calmont, Davies and Pacifica.

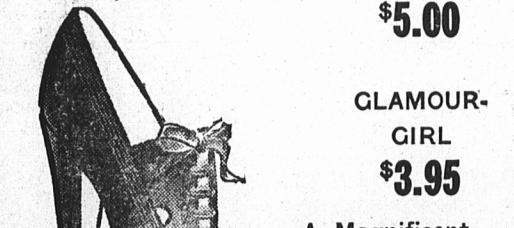

Reveals Nazis And Fascists Operated Here

TORONTO, March 8—(CP)—Nazi and Fascist inspired organizations were operating in pre-war Canada taking their orders directly from the German and Italian government officials, Superintendent V. A.M. Kemp of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police said last night in an address to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police here.

German organizations known as the National Socialist Workers' Party, the German Labor Front and the Canadian League for German Culture were discovered operating under the aegis of a body known as the Auslands organization with headquarters in Stuttgart, Germany, he said.

This organization was founded to co-ordinate all Nazi groups abroad and had at its head a cabinet minister who directed the functions of German ambassadors, consuls and other government officials in the German foreign service, Superintendent Kemp said.

German-Canadians were induced to join these organizations with the promise of benefits, such as sickness and unemployment insurance, which never were known to have materialized, he said. Once the member was in the party he was indoctrinated with Nazi ideology and sympathies and soon became a potential Nazi of the first order.

Similarly, the Italian organization known as the Fascio Abroad was sponsored by the Italian Fascist party and operated among Italian-Canadians throughout Canada.

Italian youth organizations in Canada offered the more distinguished of their members free trips to Italy where they attended summer camps especially conducted for the instruction of Fascist youth abroad, Superintendent Kemp said.

In one year no fewer than 16 youths left a certain Canadian city to join one of these camps in Italy, he said.

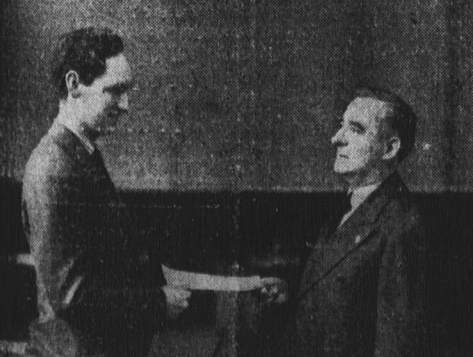

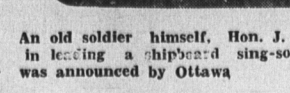
