Late Market News

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Feb. 10—The local dairy markets continued to remain unchanged, although a continuation of the firm tone was reported. Finest New Zealand butter was quoted at from 36 1/2 to 38 1/2 cents a pound. Eastern Townships was the same price. Included in the day's receipts were 1,424 cases of New Zealand product. The fact that egg stocks were at a low level and outside prices high again firmed the egg market. Warmer weather was expected to warrant the reductions made in fresh egg prices last week. Quotations now are from 42 to 56 cents a dozen. The cheese, poultry and potato markets continued firm without change.
OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 10—Domestic egg supplies in Canada are still far from sufficient to meet requirements and steady importations are still being made from the U. S.
TORONTO—This egg market is unchanged, but nervous with increasing receipts expected shortly. Dealers are quoting country shippers for local current receipts extras 45 to 46; first 44 to 45; pullets extras 35 to 39; seconds 33 to 35, delivered cases returned. Fresh eggs are selling to retailers at extras 52 to 53; firsts 50 to 51; pullets extras 45 to 48. Montreal, Ontario receipts are light as are also supplies from British Columbia. Two cars of U. S. fresh eggs and four cars of U. S. storage arrived today. U. S. fresh eggs are jobbing on spot at extras 51; firsts 49; seconds 46 to 47. Fresh eggs are meeting with a strong demand.
WINNIPEG—Local receipts here are showing a slight increase, but are far from sufficient for requirements. No supplies are available from British Columbia and importations are being made from the United States. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs, extras 42; firsts 40; seconds 32.
EDMONTON—With favorable weather conditions prevailing egg production here is starting to show some increase. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs, extras 40 to 42; seconds 37 to 38; pullets extras 33 to 35.
VANCOUVER—Receipts here are showing a slight increase, but there is a very heavy consumptive demand and incubator operators are also taking eggs from market channels. Dealers are paying producers extras 37; firsts 35; pullets extras 33 to 34.

RUSTICO CROSS ROADS

Great "Talkie" At Prince Edward

Ramon Novarro, both talking and singing, was the novelty which drew a full house of the young man's admirers to the Prince Edward Theatre last night. Curiosity, however, was soon replaced by definite and complete admiration, for "Devil-May-Care" is a corking picture, and Ramon Novarro is even more interesting vocally than he is in his long series of successful silent pictures. His singing voice is lovely, and "Charming" is not the least delightful of the half a dozen songs which were written for him by Herbert Stothart, the co-composer of "Rose Marie."

A story of adventure, romance and comedy in the period intervening between the exile of Napoleon to Elba, and his return to France, gives Novarro an excellent opportunity to display the sure and deft dramatic touch which is his. He is supported by a very pretty and capable young newcomer to the screen, little Miss Dorothy Jordan, of musical comedy fame. Other players who do well-balanced work include John Miljan and Marion Harris. Sidney Franklin's direction is characterized by deft surety. We recommend this as excellent entertainment.

Honeymoon Flats A House Of Mirth

An intimate, sophisticated revelation of newly-married life is contained in Universal's clever comedy, "Honeymoon Flats," which began its run yesterday at the Capitol Theatre with George Lewis and Dorothy Gulliver co-starring.

The story is well-directed, smooth and progresses evenly under increasing suspense to the very last scene. It is all about the young Claytons, the girl a daughter of wealthy parents and the boy a struggling young college graduate who insists that he support his wife on his own salary despite his mother-in-law's patronizing attitude. It also concerns a friend who is married, both he and his wife having their private love affairs. These are worked into the story neatly. The picture is revealing and interesting, especially to all people who still consider marriage a romance and even to those who don't but did at least during the first year.

"Honeymoon Flats" permits them to peek behind the boufior curtains into the life of a young couple who are more or less baffled and bewildered by their new status. Their quarrels are humorous and the "in-laws" butting in on everything, add much to the hilarity of this intensely human comedy of affairs.
