—"Young Widow," Hunt Stromberg's current film hit, is at the Capitol Theatre through United Artists release. With a theme as timely as today's absorbing headlines, the film is a smartly-paced comedy with a smooth blend of heart-catching drama, smart comedy and poignant romance. Not the least of its assets is the exciting appearance of lovely black-eyed, dark-haired Jane Russell in a starring role. Jane a Howard Hughes discovery known far and wide as the pinup queen of the 2nd World War was loaned to Producer Stromberg for the exacting title role in this entertaining drama and has more than amply repaid his faith in her talents. She turns in a performance that ranks high in film annals, and goes far towards substantiating his predictions that she is right in line with such stars as Garbo, Joan Crawford, Myrna Loy and the late Jean Harlow, all of whom were given the right lift upward by Stromberg at strategic moments of their careers. Louis Hayward, recently enstared out of the Marines, shares stellar honors with Jane. The story concerns a newspaper woman, (Jane) who resigns her assignment in Britain when her husband, a young reconnaissance photographer attached to the Air Corps in the European area, is killed. Back home and brooding over her loss, she finds it hard to pick up the threads of her life again. How she gradually comes through

forms the basis of a charming picture as has come out of the Hollywood studios these post-war days.
