THE OLDER THE MAN THE BETTER.

Sir George Birdwood, who will be eighty-one this year, recently discussed in London the dictum of Lord Alverstone that judges at their best were sixty-five to eighty.

"I cannot understand why people imagine that this is the day of the young man," he said. "Now, more than ever, it is the day of the old man with vitality. Of course Lord Alverstone is perfectly right when he says that a judge is at his best from the age of sixty-five to eighty. The idea of forcing any able man doing great service to the State to retire before he is proved absolutely unfit for his work is to me monstrous. An able man's brain goes on developing right up to ninety and over—only his body decays.

"The older a man is, so long as he is quite fit, the better he is intellectually—the broader his vision, the saner and wiser his outlook, and the more mature his opinions."

NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 1.—In the Tuesday elections Massachusetts and New Jersey will choose governors and other State officers. Maryland will express its choice for a United States senator, while New York and several other States will vote for minor officials and members of the legislature.

Congressmen will be elected to fill vacancies in the Third district of Massachusetts, Third district of Maryland and the Thirteenth and Twentieth districts of New York.

These congressional elections, together with the State elections in Massachusetts and New Jersey, are focusing attention to a remarkable degree for an off year.

But attracting even more popular attention than the State elections is the mayoralty contest in New York City, where a formidable opposition has united under the Fusion standard in an effort to defeat Tammany Hall.

Of much local interest and importance, also, are the municipal elections to be held in Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Buffalo, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Louisville and a number of other cities. In nearly all of these municipal contests the reform question is a dominant issue.

Final arguments in the Government suit for the dissolution of the International Harvester Company, capitalized at \$140,000,000, will be heard in the United States circuit court at St. Paul, Monday. Attorney General McReynolds will appear in person to insist that the stock of the corporation, if dissolution is ordered, shall be disposed of under such stringent provisions as will make impossible a joint control of the com-

THE LITTLE REPUBLIC OF PANAMA

The little Republic of Panama is preparing to celebrate on Monday the tenth anniversary of its independence from Colombia and coming, as it does, soon after the turning of water into the Culebra Cut, there is likely to be a continuous round of celebrations lasting for some time.

The hearing of Harry W. Jones, secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, is scheduled to take place Wednesday before a United States Commissioner in Indianapolis. The charge against Jones is conspiracy to transport explosives on which President Ryan and 27 other officials and members of the union were convicted and sent to prison some months ago.

Leading social purity workers of the world will assemble in Minneapolis Friday to attend the seventh international congress of the World's Purity Federation. The congress will continue its sessions for five days.

SUPREME COURT.—It is notified that the Michaelmas Term of the Supreme Court for Queen's County opens on next Tuesday, at the Court House, Charlottetown, at 11 a. m.

CHANGE OF OFFICE.—A change of office in Charlottetown is being made by the Dominion Express Company. From the premises they occupy at present on Queen St., they will move to the building on the corner of Sydney and Queen St., on which Mr. Brown at present carries on a postcard establishment. The change will take place at the beginning of the new year.

IN GREAT DEMAND.—The demand for information on fox breeding and fur farming generally, is indicated by the fact that two editions of *Fur Farming in Canada*, by Professor J. Walter Jones, have already been exhausted and a third edition is now in the hands of the printers. The demand for this book from the United States has been so great, that although printed for free distribution, the government was obliged to charge 50 cents a copy to cover cost of mailing.

PURE BREEDING ENCOURAGED.—The Dominion Government are making worthy efforts for the encouragement and fostering of the breeding of pure bred strains in live stock in this province in common with the entire Dominion. They offer now to provide such associations as may be formed with the rules, regulations that they have made in this connection with number of pure-bred rams, boars, stallions and bulls for the purpose of being used in the promotion of the raising of pure-bred stock. In this province more than one association of this kind has been formed; one being organized at Lewis, Queen's County, another at Iona, and a third is being started at Newtown Cross; while there is every probability that a fourth will be formed at Eldon. The Association at Lewis has asked for and will be supplied with pure bred rams; other breeds have been asked for in the case of the other associations.

GOOD OPPORTUNITY.—The attention of all our readers is directed to the announcement made by Bruce Stewart & Company, which appears in another part of this issue. The former is to have a capital of \$290,000, divided into 2,900 shares of the value of \$100 each, and its office or chief place of business is to be situated at O'Leary Station, Prince County. The applicants for the incorporation of this company are: Murdoch Kennedy, Merchant, of Bradalbane; George Horne, farmer, of O'Leary Station; Charles Kennedy, attorney-at-law and M.D., of the city of New York; Samuel Kennedy Jr., merchant, of Bradalbane; William Kennedy, merchant, of O'Leary; Peter N. Pate, merchant, of O'Leary; James Kennedy, merchant, of Kensington; Ewen G. McMillan, merchant tailor, of Boston, Mass.; John A. Messervy, merchant, of Charlottetown, all of whom are to be the first or provisional directors of the company. The proposed capital of the Mount Edward Company is \$400,000, divided into four thousand shares of \$100 each, and the chief place of business will be situated in Charlottetown. The applicants for incorporation in this case are: Alfred W. Sterns, gentleman; John R. Dinis, farmer; Wallace Leitch, accountant; Howard R. Hilson, merchant; all of Charlottetown; Mrs. Emma J. Ramsay, of Summerside; Ernest W. Coffin, merchant, of Charlottetown; J. Howard Ferguson, merchant of Peterborough, Ontario; Wesley Caldwell, banker, New York City; the first five of whom are to be the provisional directors of the company.

DEMAND FOR CROSS FOXES.—There is now a big and growing demand for cross foxes, and one of the principal reasons for this may be found in the fact that several people who ranched them last year met with great success in securing litters in which there was a good percentage of silvers. Also accountable is the additional fact that there has been this year a substantial rise in the price of the pelts of cross-foxes, as reported in the June Lamson sales. That the demand has increased is evident from recent organization of more than one ranch for the breeding of cross foxes.

BREEDING BEEF CATTLE.—That the farmers of this province are being awakened to the importance of breeding cattle for beef purposes is evidenced by the interest that is being taken in the association that was formed in Charlottetown a few weeks ago for the promotion of the raising of pure bred cattle for beef purposes. The association's membership is increasing in a manner that causes gratification, showing that the people are alive to the advantages that lie before them in the fostering of this industry. One peculiar advantage that the members of the Association get through their connection with the association is the information that is being disseminated of such pure bred cattle that any of its members may have for sale.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE.—A very interesting meeting was that of the Norborne Women's Institute, held in the school on Wednesday, October 23rd. It is encouraging to the officers to note the increasing number of members and visitors present. Two of the ladies sang the Island Hymn as an opening number and it was very much appreciated. Cake making was the topic discussed by the supervisor and members, among whom many good recipes were interchanged. At the close of the meeting a dainty supper added greatly to the sociability and enjoyment of the afternoon. This was served by Mrs. R. Bonness, Mrs. Arch. Harding, Miss F. Sharp, Mrs. J. W. Stewart, Mrs. Frank Webster and Mrs. John Harding, to all of whom the hearty thanks of the meeting was given.

PROPOSED AMALGAMATION.—Arrangements are now in course of being carried through for the amalgamation of an important one of Charlottetown's fox companies with the new fur farming proposition to which reference was made in the issue of The Guardian of Friday week before last. The existing fox company will be merged into the new company and the concern will be known as the General Fur Farms, Limited. The present fox company has four pairs of foxes, and the new proposition brings four pairs also into the business, so that the combined company will have eight pairs of foxes to open business with. As previously stated in these columns, the General Fur Farms, Limited, as its name indicates will conduct fur-farming on a very diversified basis, in fact its interests will be more varied in a sense than any other fur farming business present. Besides foxes this company will undertake the raising of mink, skunk, musk rat, fisher and marten, at the outset, with the intention of farming other fur-bearing animals as the business progresses. The flotation of the new company is progressing rapidly. A large gang of men will be set to work this week on the new ranches, which are to be built in an excellent location within two miles of the city.

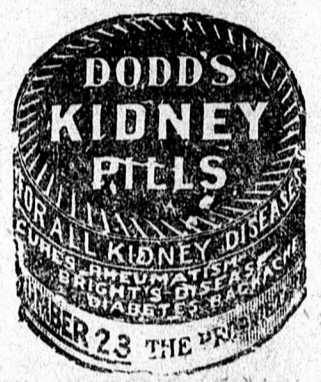
NEW LABOR LAW FOR WOMEN.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Nov. 1.—The new labor law for women, which was passed by the Pennsylvania State legislature at its last session and which was approved by the governor on July 24 last, went into effect today and the State labor authorities will make a determined effort to enforce every provision of the new law. The new law prohibits the employment of women during more than ten

hours a day or more than 54 hours a week. Extra hours of work, not to exceed two hours for any day and for not more than three days in any week, shall be permitted only in case of a legal holiday or in case the work should be interrupted by repairs or alterations in the factory or shop. Girls under 21 years shall not be employed before 6 in the morning and after 9 p.m. Those 21 years of age or older may be employed until 10 p.m. The law also provides many regulations tending to improve the working conditions and sanitary surroundings of the feminine workers.
