NO APOLOGY IS COMING FROM THE HON. MR. BLAIR

Senator Cox Will Have to Wait a Long Time Before the Ex-Minister Railways Will Make Any Amende Honorable for His Famous Reference to the G. T. P. Promoter —He Reiterates Statement in an Interview.

OTTAWA, October 13.—Senator Cox tonight, spurred by Bolduc, denied that he had any connection with the Grand Trunk Pacific in its initial state, as the project was well advanced before Mr. Hays asked him to go on the board. He repudiated the reflections cast upon him and said he expected an ample apology from Hon. Mr. Blair.

Ottawa, October 14.—Mr. Blair does not propose to offer any apology to Senator Cox, as demanded by the latter in the senate last night. Mr. Blair is still of the opinion that 'Cox can't wait' and he's challenged the Grand Trunk Pacific promoter to show some good reason as to why an apology should be forthcoming.

THE EX-MINISTER INTERVIEWED.

Mr Blair was seen this morning at his residence on O'Connor street. Free, to a considerable extent, from the harassing care of the more strenuous political life, the ex-minister is the picture of health and is perfectly satisfied with the course he has pursued, knowing how it comments itself to a great mass of the thinking people of the Dominion. He was asked as to what he had to say in respect to Senator Cox's remark that he was awaiting apology or explanation for the sentence used by Mr Blair—'Cox can't wait.'

The ex-minister thought a minute and then replied: "No, I have no apology to make, nor explanation to offer. If Senator Cox says he isn't pressing the government in connection with the Grand

Trunk Pacific matter, if he can truthfully affirm that he didn't urge the construction of the road, then he might claim, very fairly, that I ought not to have made use of his name in my remarks in the house of commons when the bill was under consideration but," and Mr Blair paused for a minute. "I don't apprehend that the senator will deny anything of the kind. I reiterate that I do not see that there is anything for me to explain or apologize for. A similar remark might truthfully be applied to almost every one who was urging the government to aid his scheme, and I do not see just why it should be regarded as a reflection upon his integrity to say he couldn't wait. Promoters are not often willing to wait if they can help it."

HE WAS A G. T. P. PROMOTER.

'Senator Cox was a promoter of the G. T. P.' was asked. 'Wasn't he very prominently mentioned for the presidency?' was the reply. Beyond that Mr Blair would not go. 'Are you going to retire from politics when this parliament ends?' 'I haven't made up my mind yet as to the course I'll pursue.' 'Will you accept the presidency of the railway commission?' The ex-minister wouldn't talk on this subject at all. 'What are the chances of a general election this year?' 'I haven't any inside information' said Mr Blair, 'but personally I don't expect an election in the near future.'
