The following markets will be of interest for comparison with Prince Edward Island. "Wholesale the potatoes market in Montreal is steady and for car lots prices range from 65c to 70c, and in a jobbing way 85c to 90c. In Ottawa potatoes are retailing at 80c to 85c."

The Boston Post says: "Mike 'Twin' Sullivan will slip away for a little trip to Prince Edward Island about Saturday. Mike has made arrangements with Jim Pendergast to show in Charlottetown the Tom Foley of Halifax. The bout will be ten rounds' duration, and a fast clever battle is assured. Mike and Foley fought a draw a few years ago in Halifax."

Rev. Thos. Hicks, pastor of Maryville, is steadily getting a grip of the situation there, and all are looking forward with some little restlessness to the time when the Methodists will again be able to worship in a public way under their own vine and fig tree. It seems the question of the proposed new edifice is a live question in the minds of some of the people. People passing Glenaladale, the fine farm now owned by M. C. McKinnon, last week enjoyed the privilege of seeing farming operations in progress with a veritable western rush. On Saturday, Monday and Tuesday the binder was cutting grain, two teams hauling the grain to the barn where it was being threshed at the rate of 80 to 100 bushels per hour by a thresher and cleaner run by a gasoline engine, other teams were, at the same time hauling the grain to the railway station where it was loaded in cars for market. Mr. McKinnon had this year ninety acres under oats which yielded an average of fifty bushels per acre.

The Missionary Committee met on Monday and Tuesday, the 15th and 17th inst., in the parsonage at Shediac. There were present Revs. N. McLaughlin, Thos. Marshall, H. E.
