**ABOUT MOTIONS AND AMENDMENTS.**

Some young men in Uigg have written The Guardian asking for information in regard to motions and amendments, the methods of putting them before a meeting and so on. Nearly every organized society has its own rules of procedure and these are binding upon its members. In public meetings the Parliamentary rules must govern the action of a presiding officer. The following abstract from the rules with regard to motions and amendments may be sufficient for the guidance of those making the inquiry.

A motion must be seconded, or it falls to the ground; being seconded, the motion is handed in writing to the Speaker, who must read it before debate can be had upon it. There are several ways in which a motion may be opposed; it may be met by a direct negative, that is by simply voting against it, or by an amendment, or by a motion to postpone, or by proceeding to the next order of the day, or by moving the previous question, or by the simple motion of adjournment.

As to amendments, one amendment to the original motion and an amendment to the amendment are in order. Each of these must be seconded and read from the chair before it can be debated or voted upon. When the debate has ended if there is a motion, an amendment thereto and also an amendment to the amendment, the speaker reads the motion and the amendments in order, and says, "The question is on the amendment to the amendment," and calls upon those in its favor to say "Yeay" and those of a contrary mind to say "Nay." The last amendment is always first voted upon. Should the amendment be adopted it then becomes the substantive motion and may be amended in the same way that the original motion was amended. Thus a number of successive amendments to the original motion may be proposed.

The mover of a motion, if the motion is debated and opposed, is entitled to speak a second time in closing the debate, but this privilege does not belong to the mover of an amendment.

The Maritime Stock Breeders' Association (under whose auspices the Annual Winter Fair has been so successfully held for the past ten years) have decided to hold a second Horse Show at Amherst on April 4th, 5th and 6th. From the number of entries promised the directors feel assured of success from a show standpoint. It is understood that there will be a number of exhibits from this Province.
