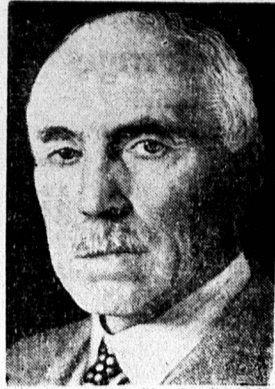

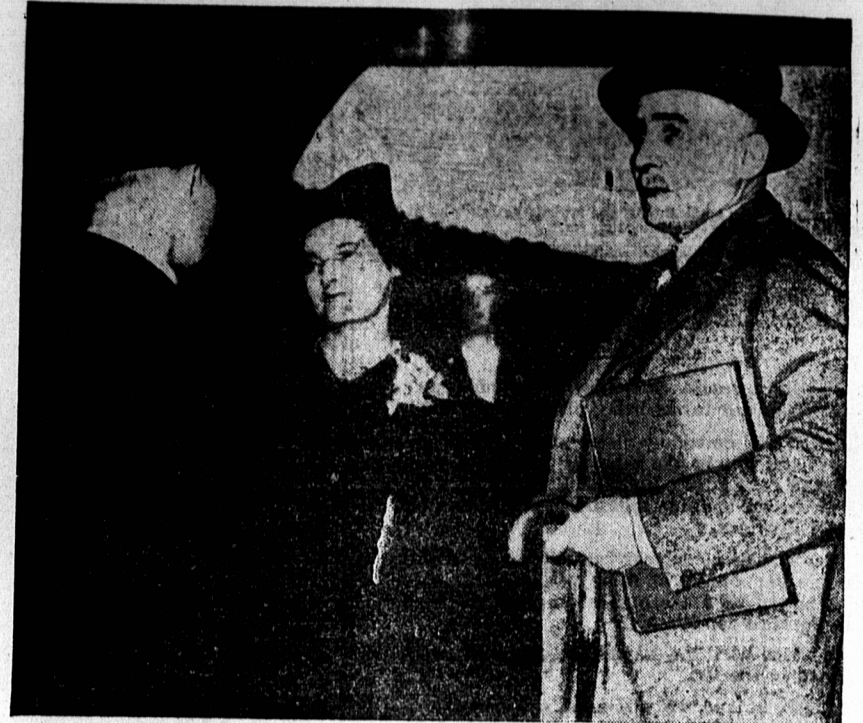

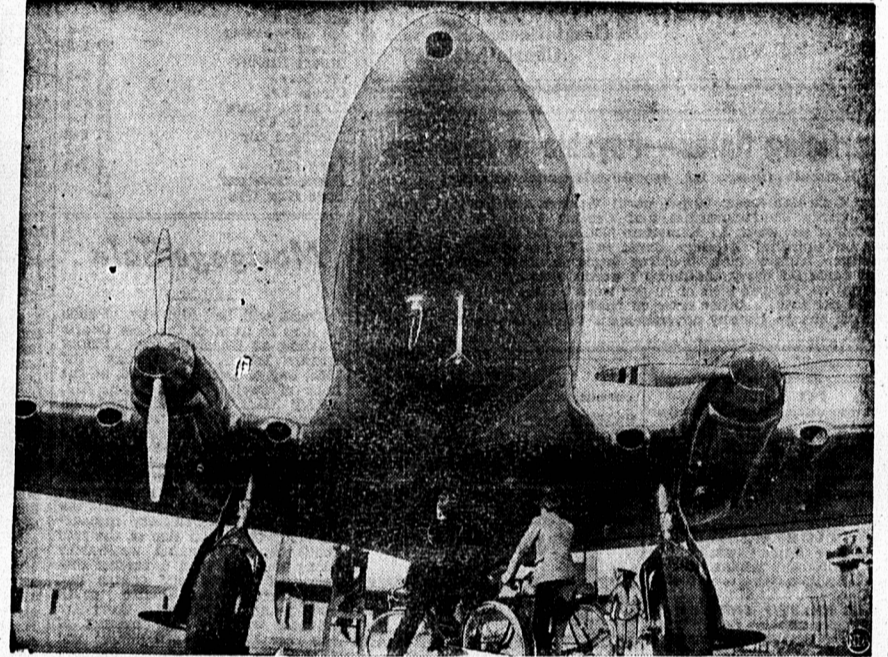
This is a close-up of Sir Frank Bowater taken in his coach at the commencement of the parade.



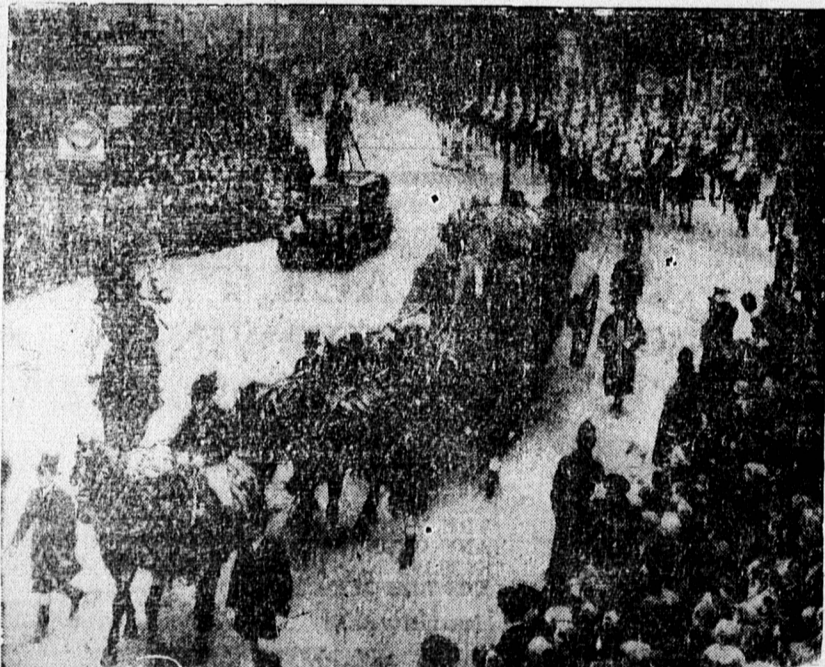

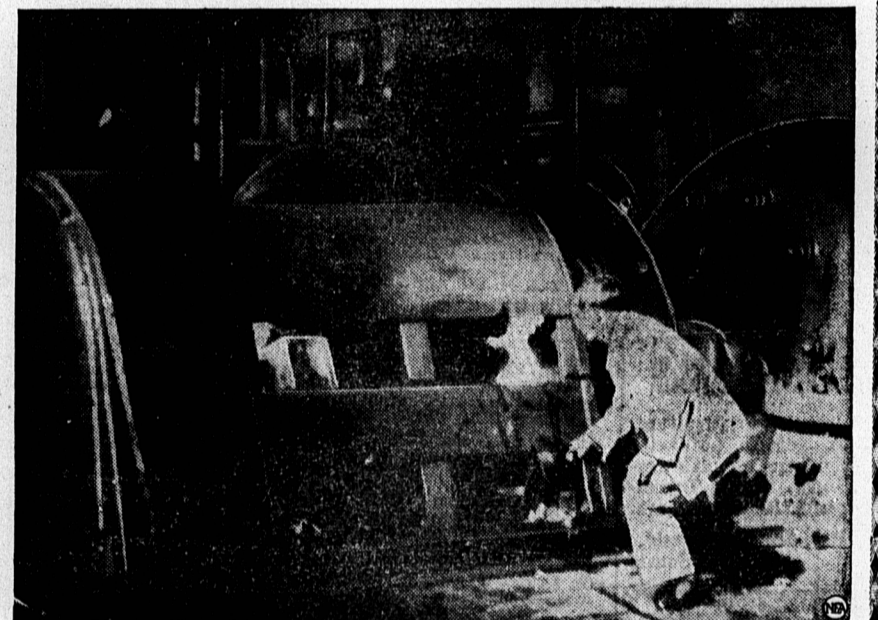

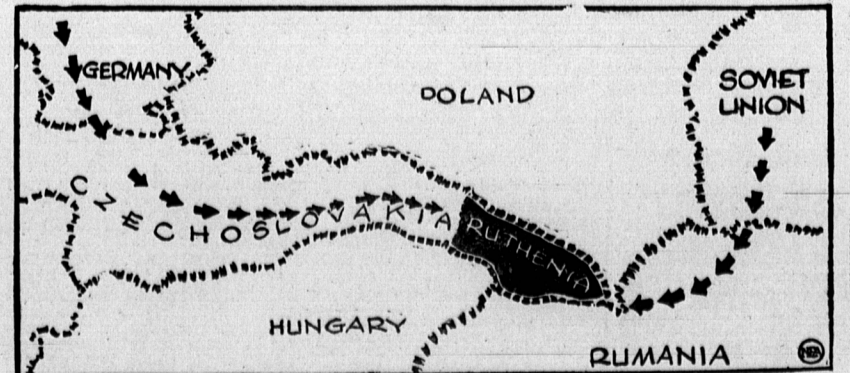

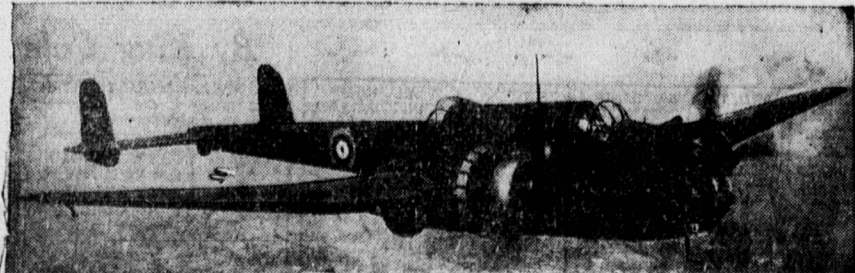


With Japanese clamoring at gates of Hankow just before fall of city, a Chinese pours kerosene on generators, fires machinery as part of China's "scorched" tactics.

Tiny Ruthenia--Europe's Newest Pawn



Ruthenia in eastern Czechoslovakia becomes the new focal point of Europe's clashing national ambitions as Hungary and Poland seek a common boundary by dividing the province between them. An alarmed Germany sees in such a move the blocking of its projected advance to the east, indicated by arrows. A contiguous Hungarian-Polish border also would create an effective barrier to Russian westward movement also indicated by arrows.



Approximately 100 of these Handley Page Hampden bombers are to be constructed in the Dominion under the order announced by the British Government. It is expected that the machines will be built in sections in several separate plants, assembled in either Toronto or Montreal, fitted with British engines and delivered by air in Britain.
