Backs up Railways

The prestige of the government of Canada is to be requested to back up the Canadian Railways, represented by the Canadian railway war board in their effort to get back from the United States the 22,000 freight cars now overdue from the American roads. While the efforts of the board have been successful in increasing the daily returns of Canadian freight cars, the numbers held in the United States continue to increase. The influence of the minister of railways is to be asked, so that direct pressure may be brought to bear upon Secretary McAdoo, in his new capacity, as director-general of the seven hundred and fifty American railways.

Fuel Situation

The co-operation of the government is to be further requested in regard to the fuel situation as it affects the railway. The railway war board this afternoon addressed the Dominion fuel controller, C. A. Magrath, requesting that the American mines be required, through the United States fuel controller, to furnish a better quality of coal to Canada. Not only have the prices on coal for Canadian railways risen enormously, but the number of heat units per ton has dropped.

After Idle Men

There will be no escape from conscription on the part of Canadian railway men who were exempted on the application of the railways, but who may be taking advantage of the situation, to stay at home, instead of turning out to help move trains in the winter weather. At the meeting this afternoon an order was made by which all the railways in Canada are required to report the number of days worked by each man who secured exemption on the application of the railways. The names of such men will be sent to the exemption tribunal with notification that the request for their exemption has been withdrawn.

Life in France

The following letter has been received by Elby Howlett, Annandale, from his brother, Gr. Roy Howlett, 5th Siege Batt. now in France. 13-12-17.

Dear Elby:— I must try and drop you a few lines to-night as I have not written you for sometime. I have been in this country for sometime and I am getting along fine, we marched all day yesterday about fifteen miles. The roads here are just about like the roads home in April, in fact the weather is very much like April weather here.

France is a nice looking farming country. Fields of winter wheat are all up green and they look pretty. I had a taste of real war yesterday. We passed through a town that Fritz was shelling. It was quite interesting for a while but we got through alright. I did not mind it very much. We are billeted at present in a ruined French town just behind the lines. This place is a sorry looking spectacle. I tell you as most of the buildings were completely demolished by shell fire and the remainder partially ruined. Very few civilians remain here. We were certainly used well in the town we left yesterday. We were there a week and had a fine time. The lady of the house brought us hot coffee every night before we retired and in the morning before we got up. She very nearly spoiled us. It was like heaven to us.

We all slept together on the floor of the dining room and they used us well. There will always be a home here for any of us if we have occasion to pass that way again. There are five of us who chum together and we get along just fine as they are awfully decent chaps. They are Leslie Stacey from Oshawa, Ontario, Fred Heslop, Douglas Howland and Jack Antilla. Stacey was a business manager of a large store in Ontario, Heslop is one of the original Princess Pats. Howland is well educated having worked with the London Stock Exchange and Military Headquarters at London. Antilla worked in a store I think, so we are quite a collection.

This is some game and the sooner it ends the happier I will be. They are having quite a time over conscription over there I tell you. I hope it goes through. If it does not well pity help us fellows. It will not take you and I am glad because you are needed more where you are. I have not received any mail for a long time but hope to receive some soon. Write often and tell me all the news I remain
