(Continued from page ten.) back the tears as he thought of the doomed ship. "He turned to the men lowering the boat and shouted, 'Well, boys, it's every man for himself.' He then took one of the children standing by him on the bridge and jumped into the sea. He endeavored to reach the overturned boat but did not succeed. This was the last seen of Captain Smith."

McGinn said that Captain Smith from the bridge directed the lowering of the lifeboats. He said that the story that Captain Smith had committed suicide as the Titanic was going down was without foundation. HALIFAX, April 21.—The steamer Rhein bound from Bremen for Baltimore, and the steamer Bremen from Bremen for New York passed near the scene of the Titanic disaster on Saturday afternoon. In 42.1 North, 49.13 W., the Rhein sighted bodies and wreckage.

The steamer Bremen when in 42.20 North and 49.20 West, reports having sighted considerable wreckage, and also large number of bodies from the ill-fated White Star liner. The steamer reported that the cable ship MacKay-Bennett was then steaming towards the vicinity of where the bodies were floating.

Not one of the 1,424 passengers on board the Allan Line steamer Victorian, knew of the terrible Titanic catastrophe until they reached port at 9 Saturday morning. The passengers were shocked beyond expression, when informed of the fate of the White Star liner Titanic. The reason given by the officers of the Victorian was that of fear of causing the uneasiness on board. Many of the saloon passengers, as they wended their way along the gang plank, sobbed.

The sensational news of the disaster was received by the Victorian eight hours after it occurred and this fact coupled with the absolute necessity which prevailed, combined to make the passage a unique one. The only persons on board who knew of the accident after the message was received was the wireless operator and the Captain, Edmund Outram. The message was received by the Victorian's wireless operator and conveyed to the commander eight hours after the ship struck. The Victorian was then 1,300 miles from the scene of the accident.

Saturday, April 21. The House opened to the public at 11:20 o'clock.

HON. MR. McNEILL replied to questions of Mr. Gallant, as to a bridge at Miminigash, a new road in Lot 9, and a new school at Kelley Road, to all of which consideration was promised. He replied to a further question by Mr. Myers as to a wharf needed at Bonshaw Bridge.

HON. MR. McKINNON introduced a bill to further amend the Act for the encouragement of Agriculture. HON. MR. McNEILL introduced a bill to incorporate the George B. Brown Fur-Farming Company.

MR. MYERS moved the House into committee on the bill to incorporate the Silver Tip Black Fox Company, Limited, which was agreed to.

The bill to incorporate the French River Farming Company, was read a first time, and the bill to incorporate the Riverside Farming Company read a second time, committed and agreed to. The St. James Presbyterian Church bill, Souris, was read a third time and passed. The House in committee agreed to the bill to incorporate the Eastern Teachers' Association, the bill for the encouragement of Agriculture, Messrs. Richards, J.A. Dewar, Simpson and others took part. It was largely technical. The bill was agreed to with amendments.

The House adjourned till next Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Tuesday, April 23, 1912. The House opened to the public at 3:42 o'clock.

HON. MR. McNEILL in reply to Mr. Richards said the Government is aware of the condition of Beaton Bridge, Mr. Dewar would give attention to this and other bridges needing repair as speedily as possible. To Mr. Martin, Dr. Dewar and Mr. Delaney he promised consideration to various petitions as to roads and bridges in their districts.

HON. MR. STEWART moved a resolution to amend the existing law and make provision for a three tax on every casual trader not a resident, who indulges in collecting or canvassing for the sale of intoxicating liquors within the Province.

MR. SPRAKER said the resolution was one requiring to be submitted by message from the Lieutenant Governor, or by his permission, which Mr. Stewart said had been obtained.

The House in committee of the whole, Mr. Dewar in the chair, considered the resolution.

that under the law taxing commercial travellers the tax on those taking orders for the sale of liquors was \$200. When the general law affecting commercial travellers was repealed this section was left, but had remained a dead letter. These men had paid no license. It had been decided that the fee was ultra vires of the Legislature. We could not prohibit nor stop this taking of orders but we could tax the non-residents who come here to take them. He thought this the best thing to be done.

HON. MR. DALTON thought resident agents taking orders for liquor houses should also be taxed. The resolution was reported and a bill introduced by Mr. Stewart embodying the same.

HON. MR. DALTON moved a resolution that it is expedient to make provision for the better government of the village of Tignish, to define limits and make regulations for it. The resolution was adopted without discussion and a bill introduced to give effect.

HON. MR. McNEILL moved the second reading of the bill to incorporate the P.E. Island Fox Breeding Association, Limited, and the House in committee agreed to the same with an amendment changing the name to the Progressive Island Fox Breeding Association, Limited.

MR. STEWART'S bill to amend the Act to make provision for the necessary in case of certain promises and engagements was read a second time and agreed to in committee.

The bill to incorporate the Eastern Teachers' Association was read a third time and passed. Also the bill to incorporate Rogers and Company, Limited.

MR. PREMIER moved the House into committee to further consider the Road Act, 1912.

The Road Act was agreed to in committee and the bill to incorporate the Silver Tip Black Fox Company, also the bill to incorporate the Summerside and Kensington Fox Breeding Company, were each read a third time and passed. Also the bill to incorporate the French River Farming Company and the bill to incorporate the Appandale Lumber Company. These are all limited liability companies.

MR. MYERS moved the second reading of the bill to incorporate the French River Farming Company Limited and the House in committee agreed to the same.

HON. MR. STEWART moved a resolution on which to base a bill to amend the Act relating to Specially Magistrates, by providing that they shall hold office during pleasure. The resolution was adopted and the bill introduced.

HON. MR. McKINNON submitted the annual report of the Department of Agriculture. The House adjourned till three o'clock tomorrow.
