### DAMAGES FOR SLANDER

Claimed Against the Franklin Syndicate—Yaqui Indians May Surrender.

New York Nov. 22.—(Special).—William F. Miller Manager of the Franklin Syndicate, has been arrested on suit for \$50,000 damages in slander. The suit is brought by the publisher of a Wall Street journal who attacked Miller's methods and the latter reported it was blackmail.

### BRUTAL WIFE MURDER.

The wife of James Baxter left her husband and went to the home of a friend, Jerry Rogan. Baxter tried to get her to leave and she refused. He then shot her. One bullet passed through Mrs. Ryan's body killing a child standing behind her. Rogan pounded Baxter unmercifully and would have killed him but was prevented. Mrs. Ryan will die.

### CAPTAIN LEAVES VESSEL.

In Montreal and the Authorities take Possession.

MONTREAL, Nov. 22.—(Special).—Capt. Stewart arrived here with the three-masted schooner Massasail from Halifax, for the Great Lakes. He left the vessel here declaring the contract up. He even declined to pay the pilot, so the authorities took possession. The owner lives in Chicago.

### ESTCOURT IS NOW ISOLATED GERMAN BOERS SWARMING SOUTH TO PIETERMARITZBURG.

### ALL READY FOR ACTIVE WORK

Cleary Has 17,500 Men to Relieve Estcourt and Ladysmith—Methuen Near Belmont—Stirring Scene at a London Theatre—Volunteers Insured for \$500 Each—The Laurier Club.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—(Special).—The Boers have cut off Estcourt and now control the railroad to Mooi River, twenty miles south. They are swarming southward and appear to be threatening Pietermaritzburg.

### BOERS STEAL 300 HORSES.

The Boers raided the Natal Stud Company's farm and stole 300 blooded horses.

### IT IS ABOUT TIME.

Preparations for active operations now seem to be about completed.

### CLEARY'S FIGHTING FORCE.

General Cleary will have, it is believed, 17,000 to 18,000 men for his march to relieve Estcourt and Ladysmith.

A large part of his force will be marines with naval guns.

### ON THE CAPE BORDER.

General Methuen's division to relieve Kimberly is now near Belmont where the Boers are strongly entrenched.

The British have re-occupied Naauport, but the Boers are strong at Colesburg to resist Gen. Gatacre's advance.

### KAISER ENTERTAINED AT A STATE BANQUET AT WINDSOR.

### £2,000,000 IN PLATE

### QUEEN FACED THE PRINCE OF WALES—140 GUESTS WERE PRESENT.

WINDSOR, Eng., Nov. 21.—A late banquet was held to-night in St. George's hall. The guests numbered about 140 persons, including all the members of the British royal family and the visiting



royalties, the United States and other Ambassadors. Count Von Buelow and the whole of Emperor Williams's suite, all the members of the German Embassy in London, with the exception of Count Von Hatzfeld-Wildenburg, the German ambassador, who is ill, the members of the British cabinet, Lord Rosebury, and the other members of his late cabinet, the officers of the Imperial German yacht Hohenzollern and the German battleship Kaiser Friedrich III., and German cruiser Hela, Lord Wolseley, Lord Roberts and General Sir Evelyn Wood, Mrs. Joseph H. Choate, the



wife of the American ambassador was the king's guard chamber, famous for its Gobel tapestries. Troops of the household cavalry bearing lances lined the grand staircase, while within the banquet hall, beefsteaks and royal yeomen formed a picturesque fringe. The Queen sat at the centre of the long table, facing the Prince of Wales. On her right was Emperor William, and on her left the Duke of Connaught. Mrs. Choate had the sixth place, sitting next to the Italian Ambassador, Baron De Renzis Montanaro. Empress Au-

gusta Victoria sat on right of the Prince of Wales, with Ambassador Choate in the sixth place on this side of the table, next to Princess Aribert or Anhalt.

After the banquet the Queen's private band played in the Waterloo chamber.

The toasts were very formal. The Prince of Wales rose first, saying: "By command of the Queen, the German Emperor and Empress."

This was followed by the German national anthem.

Emperor William then raised his glass to the simple words, "The Queen," after which the British national anthem was played. As it was her birthday the Prince of Wales toasted the empress Frederick and the German national anthem was played again.

Arthur J. Balfour was unable to be present.
