DIRECTORS MEETING FARMERS' CO-OPERATION

A meeting of the directors of the Associated Farmers Co-operative Co. Ltd., was held August 16th in Charlottetown. The meeting opened at 11 a. m., and the financial statement for the period of operation was received and found satisfactory. The business before the board was then discussed and attended to. It was decided that solicitors be appointed, one in every territory to have charge of the company's affairs in their respective districts and that these men if not property holders should furnish satisfactory security.

The president then spoke of the aims and purposes of the organization showing how all buyers received the same benefits, the same prices and the same privileges regardless of the quantity or amount purchased or sold. He mentioned the saving which was being effected in all lines of farming machinery, and explained how every member who joined added his purchasing power to that of the other members, making it possible to buy in larger quantities and therefore to demand greater discounts.

Mr. J. E. Daly then spoke of the feeling existing between The Associated Farmers Co-operative Co., and other mercantile bodies. He felt that the members of this organization did not wish to injure any legitimate business, their reason for getting together was wholly for the purpose of helping and strengthening themselves. Other classes of men formed themselves into unions and found that by so doing they were more effective and better able to cope with interest which sought to injure or impose upon them.

After some further discussion the meeting adjourned to meet again in three months.

British Gains In German East Africa

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

LONDON, Aug. 17—The ring around the forces defending German East Africa is being drawn closer. An official statement received today from General Smuts, commander of the British forces in German East Africa, reports that the British have cleared the difficult hilly country and captured several important positions being separated from the central railway by only 25 miles of open country.

The statement follows:—

"General Smuts reports that on Tuesday our forces advancing from the Niguru Mountains, after overcoming slight opposition, reached the junction of the principal tracks leading to Mrogoro and Kilossa. Our columns are now clear of the difficult hilly country and in this direction are separated from the central railway by only 25 miles of open steppe."

"Further west Lt.-Col. Vandenventer having occupied Tpapula, is moving toward Kilossa."

"On Tuesday, the important town and military coastal station of Bagamojo 36 miles north of Dar-Es-Salaam, was occupied by naval forces. A naval 4.1 gun, was captured."
