One Jap Is Released After Arrests In Britain

LONDON, Aug. 5.—(CP)—Britain tonight released one of the two highly-placed Japanese businessmen seized in an empire-wide roundup of Japan's nationals.

The first Japanese arrested last Friday was Satoru Makihara, London agent for the Mitsubishi interests, and he was the first released amid growing Japanese protests and demonstrations. Eight other Japanese remained in custody in various parts of the empire.

Mayor Houde Of Montreal Is Arrested

MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—(Tuesday)—(CP)—Superintendent H. R. Gagnon of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police said early today that Mayor Camille Houde of Montreal had been taken into custody under the War Measures Act.

The arrest was made in a joint action by the R.C.M.P. and the Quebec Provincial Police, Superintendent Gagnon said. The police were executing a warrant from Justice Minister Lapointe at Ottawa.

Mr. Houde has already left for an internment camp, Gagnon said. He would not say just where the Mayor was bound. "He was taken into custody shortly after 11 o'clock last night, in a joint action of the provincial police and the R. C. M. P."

British Mastery Of Mediterranean Is Demonstrated

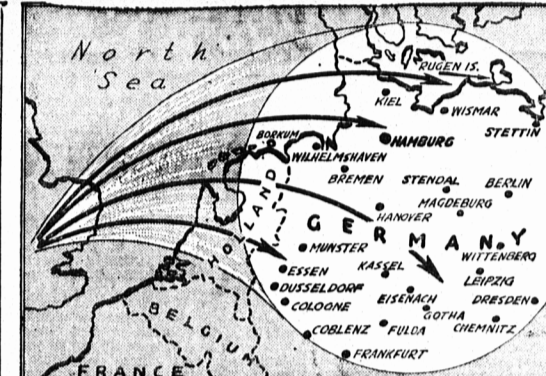
ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Aug. 5.—(CP)—Britain's mastery of the Eastern Mediterranean and control of the Suez canal spurred a partial revival of water traffic today as ships departed for the United States and Britain by way of Cape Town and others to India, Australia and the far east.

BRISTOL, N. H., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Four men died in a gas-filled well today as they descended 90 feet, one by one, to aid each other. When Martin Kease, 45, of Gorham, did not return to the surface after working for some 30 feet below the well top, Forest H. Martin, 40, of Bristol, descended to determine whether Kease was in trouble.



Striking hard and often at military objects from Borkum to Leipzig and north to Rugen on the Baltic, British airmen in more than 1,000 raids have "poverized" important German industrial centres, it was reported, Aug. 2. DIRECT HITS IN 23 RAIDS ON HAMBURG

LONDON, Aug. 5.—(CP)—Alfred Duff Cooper, Minister of Information, said tonight that the Royal Air Force registered direct hits in every one of 23 bombing attacks on the German port city of Hamburg since May 10—part of Britain's 48 raids into Germany during the last 56 nights.

Mr. Duff Cooper's statement was made in reply to German attempts to deny the Air Ministry's statement that Hamburg, greatest of continental ports, had been reduced virtually to a shambles.

Two R. C. A. F. Fliers Injured In Crash

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 5.—(CP)—Two members of the Royal Canadian Air Force suffered serious injuries when their plane crashed near Byron, about eight miles west of London, late today.

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NO. 1 NAZI JEW-BAITER REPORTED DEAD

LONDON, Aug. 5.—(CP)—A Reuters News Agency dispatch said tonight Julius Streicher, Governor of Franconia and Germany's No. 1 Jew-baiter, is dead according to reports from a well-informed source in Germany.

Streicher, 55, was with Hitler in Munich last Nov. 8 when a bomb exploded in the beer hall soon after Hitler had left.

Like many of Hitler's companions of early days when the Nazi party was struggling to power, he had served several jail terms. He was with the Fuehrer in the abortive Munich putsch in 1923 and was confined to Landsberg Penitentiary with Hitler.

German Planes Attack Areas In Britain

R.A.F. Fliers In Violent Smashes At German Bases

Fighter Squadrons Knock Nazi
Planes Out Of Sky On German-
held Side Of English Channel.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—(CP cable)—The cheering word that Britain's monthly accumulation of planes is now greater than Germany's came today from an authoritative source and, as if to back up the statement, the Air Ministry announced increasingly violent smashes on German bases.

Not only were British bombers in action deep within Germany but Royal Air Force fighter squadrons were knocking Germans out of the skies on the German-held side of the English Channel—engaging them before they could reach Britain. Three Nazi planes were shot down at a cost of one British machine.

The Bombers set ablaze an oil plant at Sterkrade in the Ruhr and hit a hangar and set fires among the airframe buildings at Krefeld without a single loss. All through Sunday night the bombers shuttled over Germany, dropping 14 tons of high explosive bombs as well as incendiary bombs on the synthetic oil works at Sterkrade. Storage tanks were shattered.

The returning pilots said they first shattered the tanks, then fired the incendiary bombs. They told of earth-jarring explosions followed by flames which lighted up the countryside for miles around.

Though production parity of planes has been reached with Germany, taking into account the machines coming from Canada and the United States, it will take some time yet to catch up to Germany's numerical superiority. But officials are sure it will be done.

There are several reasons for their optimism, among them the fact that Germany, if it has not already reached the peak of production, is reasonably close to it, while Britain's comparatively young aircraft industry has wide room for expansion.

Also, the ever-tightening blockade will make Germany's shortage of raw materials felt more each month. Authoritative quarters, telling of Britain's stepped up airplane production, compared the R.A.F. bombers and that of the German Air Force.

In a recent month the R.A.F. dropped 33,431 bombs on Germany and German-held territory while the German Air Force dropped 28,000.

One raider dropped several bombs in a rural area of southeastern England, and others were busy over Wales.

Two women rescued from mountain top

GLACIER-RANGER STATION, Wash., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Two thin women who were marooned high on Mt. Shuksan 24 hours were rescued today. Rescuers were expected to reach here tonight.

H.M.S. Margaree Is Canada's New Destroyer

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—(CP)—Navy Minister Macdonald chose the name of a river close to his birthplace in designating Canada's newest destroyer as H.M.C.S. Margaree.

This was learned today when Rear Admiral Percy W. Nelles, Chief of Naval Staff, announced the acquisition of the new warship, a former Royal Navy vessel of the Tribal class. All Canadian destroyers are named after rivers.

The Margaree River, whose valley forms one of Nova Scotia's most thrilling beauty spots, flows through Inverness County in Cape Breton, the native coast of the Dominion's new Navy Minister.

The new destroyer, which replaces H.M.C.S. Fraser, lost in a collision during evacuation operations off Bordeaux, France, in June, will soon be commissioned into the Canadian navy in a ceremony at an English port. Her complement will include surviving members of the Fraser's crew.

The tonnage of the new vessel is 1,870 and her complement of officers and men is 190. Length is 355 feet and she has eight 4.7 inch guns, seven smaller ones, and four 21-inch torpedo tubes.

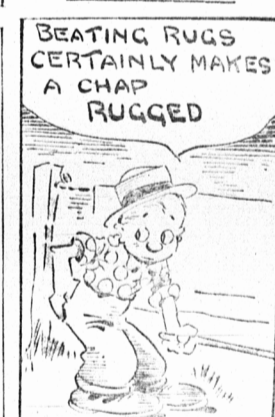
