THE COOK'S CORNER

TOMATO MARMALADE

Five pounds tomatoes (yellow preferred), 5 pounds sugar, 2 lemons, 2 oranges. Peel and cut up tomatoes, grate rind and squeeze juice from lemons, put oranges through grinder. Boil all together till a little thick, then add sugar and boil for a short time longer.

ORANGE JELLY

Two tablespoons granulated gelatine, 1/2 cup cold water, 1 1/2 cups boiling water, 1 cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups orange juice, 3 tablespoons lemon juice. Soak gelatine five minutes in cold water. Dissolve in boiling water. Strain and add to sugar and fruit juice. Turn into mould and chill. A good hot weather dessert served with devil's food, ginger cake or cookies.

STUFFED PRUNE SALAD

Eighteen large prunes, 2 packages (8 ounces) cream cheese, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup nut meats (finely chopped). Soak the prunes overnight in just enough cold water to cover. Drain. Remove the pits and fill the centres with a thoroughly blended mixture of the cream cheese and mayonnaise. Sprinkle the prunes with the nut meats and serve on crisp lettuce with mayonnaise.
