BELGIUM'S HEROIC KING AND QUEEN

Last July few people outside of Belgium knew anything about King Albert and Queen Elizabeth. Those who did know them had little idea, perhaps, that in the quiet studious looking young monarch there were burning the fires of heroism, and that when the occasion arose he would show himself to be one of the greatest hearted Kings who ever occupied a throne. Even now, while Albert of Belgium has become almost an international household word for the noblest of qualities, not very much is known about him. An interesting contribution to the rather scanty stock of information is made by Mr. Charles Maskens, first secretary to the Belgian legation in Washington. Where the world sees a gallant soldier Mr. Maskens sees the conscientious, laborious student. In other words, he sees King Albert as he was before the war.

DISLIKED BY HIS UNCLE

King Albert came to the throne on the death of his Uncle Leopold, of infamous memory. It is to the credit of the young man that he was cordially disliked by his uncle, who would never, if he could help it, have the Prince about the Royal Palace or present at any Court function. He grew up therefore on his father's estate at Ciergnon. He was studious, and his greatest pleasure seemed to be derived from long walks in the country, just as later on his chief if not, indeed, his only hobby, became mountain climbing in Switzerland. When his uncle died he was travelling through the Congo, and planning what could be done to make the territory more attractive to Belgian settlers. From the day he ascended the throne, he impressed those who came into association with him that he had only one desire, and that was to further Belgium's interests in every way possible, and especially to increase her commercial importance. Any private hobbies or interests he may have had became subordinated to this sense of responsibility.

MADE BELGIUM A GREAT NATION

Since a great many of the Belgian people are fishermen and seamen, King Albert interested himself to devise ways and means for expanding his country's overseas trade, and especially to build up a Belgian merchant marine. From his private purse he equipped a training ship, which he filled with Belgian cadets and those he sent around the world, in order that they might have first hand opportunities of studying the methods of other countries. Whatever other plans were nately dispensed last August, and now should the King live to be a very old man it is impossible that he should have time to attend to any other tasks than those growing immediately out of the war, for the rehabilitation of Belgium will not be accomplished in a generation. However, one great ambition of King Albert, achieved in a week. He has made it as famous as another little country in its day was famous.—Sparta.

QUEEN A NOTED MUSICIAN.

According to Mr. Maskens, King Albert is probably the tallest man in Belgium, while Queen Elizabeth is rather short, and in the days before their marriage, when they used to walk together through the streets of Brussels, they caused considerable amusement on account of the disparity in their height. In other respects than stature the difference between the King and the Queen is equally marked. Whatever taste his Majesty may have for art, he is no performer. The Queen, on the contrary, is a remarkable musician, and is a brilliant violinist. She interests herself in every musical event of importance in Belgium, and has done much to elevate the general taste of

SISTER OF BRITISH HATER.

It is odd to remember that Queen Elizabeth of Belgium is the daughter of the Archduke Karl Frederick of Bavaria, and that one of her kinsmen, Ruprecht, the Crown Prince, is probably the bitterest hater of England in all Germany. Wherever the sympathies of Queen Elizabeth may lie, she has proved that first of all she is a Belgian Queen. Since the beginning of the war she has remained at the King's side almost on the firing line, and has done practical work in the hospitals, despite the fact that she is not in good health. Like her heroic country, however, she has risen magnificently to the occasion. There are three children in the Royal family, Crown Prince Leopold, Prince Joseph and Princess Marie-Jose. They are now in England staying at the country estate of Lord Curzon.

WARN WOMEN AGAINST MARRIAGE WITH HINDUS

LONDON, March 21.—An important circular has just been issued by the registrar general warning English women not to marry Hindus or Moslems. The warning comes as the result of the appearance in England of a large number of Hindus and Moslems, some training for the front and others in the hospitals after being wounded in the battles in France. The Indian allies have never been more highly honored than at the present time, and because of the interest of many women in their welfare it might not inconceivably be supposed that marriages would often develop from this interest. No doubt that was in the mind of the authorities when the order was issued. It is explained in the circular that the marriage of a British Christian woman with a Hindu or Mahometan, even when valid in all respects in this country, is not necessarily so when the husband returns to India. Even if the Hindu or Mahometan husband had entered into a covenant with his Christian wife not to take an other, such a covenant could not prevent his doing so in India or in a Mahometan country, if he so desired. It is further explained that the forms observed at a marriage under English statute before registrars are not necessarily recognized by Mahometan law as giving validity to the marriage relation, and can afford no protection to the wife in a country where it is observed. A British woman marrying a Mahometan not a British subject, loses her nationality, and, living outside the British dominions would be subject to Mahometan law. With the British authorities, with long experience in handling race situations, are taking every precaution to protect their women during such a time as this, Americans who have been through a large part of France, especially in the southern section, say that many French women are not averse to being seen about the streets with Senegalese negro troops or even with Hindus.

One American who spent considerable time in Marselles, said that Indian and African soldiers were in no sense socially avoided by thousands of French people. The possibility of invalidity of marriages does not seem to have entered the minds of many women who go about with them.

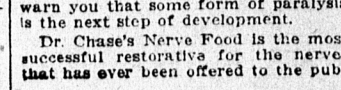
