To The People of This Province

As you see by the Press we are making a final appeal for funds for these two Societies. Elsewhere throughout Canada the usual contributions have been made for the year 1918. Owing to unavoidable causes, we in this Province, have as yet made no collections for that period.

During the past year our Branch of the Patriotic Fund has drawn from the Central Office \$35,000, and will have to continue drawing on it until at least May or June next.

We have paid out a total of ninety-four thousand dollars to the dependents of soldiers going overseas from here; and while our former collections exceed this amount, there will not be sufficient to continue payments on the same scale for the ensuing four or five months.

Now that the war is over, the Executive at Ottawa has determined to keep in full vigor this, Canada's great national benefaction, without falling back upon the Federal Government for financial assistance, urging this course on all Branches as a magnificent achievement worthy of a generous people.

We cannot afford to fall out at this, date or to fall in sustaining a record for generosity second to no Province in Canada. When the final statement of this fund is published, there must—sustain our credit—be shown a persistent, honourable and continued effort on our part, to bear a fair share of the general burden.

This is probably the last call and we would urge it being met jointly.

This year we have joined with us the Red Cross Society asking a joint contribution. Its worth is too well known to need comment, it too has decided to carry on "until the last man leaves the last hospital," urging its subscribers to remember that 100,000 Canadians are marching through Germany to secure the victory won, and that there are 42,000 yet in hospitals in France and England; with many hundreds sick and wounded returning home from the front.

We PLEDGED our word to every man who left this Province that we would maintain his family, if need be; in security and comfort. We have so far kept that pledge. If we are worthy of the sacrifice they have made we will keep it to the end.

At this Christmas season, and after these men have fought for all it represents—Peace on earth, and good will to men, and for the right to live without the mailed fist poised over our heads, we may well rejoice that the sacred commandments of humanity are again the universal law; and that the wolf and the bayonet are now at no man's door in allied lands.

Think of those who fell on Flanders fields, and who crossed the perilous sea to do battle knee to knee with brethren stripped for the fight for existence; of the men of Canada who never lost a gun, or failed in an attack, and were the point of the spear in many a bloody thrust; and of the calibre and fibre of Canadian manhood, and remember the debt we owe them, one, that we who live in the sheltered valley of contentment and ease, can never repay.

Think what it would have been if the banner of our Empire had been lowered to the greatest force for evil the world has ever known; and of the struggle, and blood, and sacrifice, of those who held this banner "ever upon the topmost hill," and with thankful hearts and generous impulse, make the Christmas homes of the men who riveted strong and welded nobly, the Empire we love, as happy as we can, though the shadow of a lost loved one may cross many thresholds.
