—BLAME THE WIND.—The clipper schooners Malabar and J. B. Martin belonging to Messrs. Joseph Reed & Co., Ltd., with full cargoes, sailed from Summerside at 3 a.m. yesterday, April 30, and arrived at Point du Chene at 1 p.m. They report no ice in the Strait and there is great indignation among the merchants and shippers of Summerside at the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Co., in not allowing them to come to this port to relieve the freight congestion as there are large quantities of produce here for export. So much produce is there on hand that the P. E. I. R. has been compelled to put an embargo on hay, oats and potatoes, nearly every ear of the service being loaded. The people want to know who is responsible, Mr. Lefursey or Mr. Richards.—X.

[With reference to the above, the politicians, for once, are not to blame. The reason must be looked for higher up. Although the Strait west of the Capes is clear of ice, east of that point is practically full. The Empress has been ready for over a week and Captain Cameron, his officers and men homesick to get back to Summerside but on account of the ice they cannot go. An attempt was made yesterday when the Empress got as far as Wood Islands when she was obliged to return on account of the ice. The only remedy at present in sight is a little more wind in several directions which, for reasons best known to itself, have so far been neglected. This is aggravating but unavoidable.—]

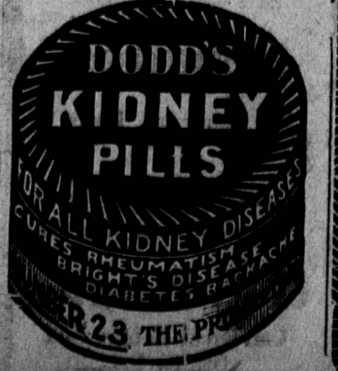
