SMALLPOX SITUATION.

Summerside Council take Action.

VACCINATION NECESSARY

The Health Officer to Superintend the Work, Examine Vessels.

An adjourned meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last night with the full board present. Dr. J. H. McLennan, health officer, who was present was asked by the board his opinion of the smallpox situation. In referring to the matter, Dr. McLennan said that we want vaccination. We are not prepared to fight an epidemic of this kind. There has been no vaccination in this town to speak of since 1885. The disease was never so prevalent throughout the Dominion in his memory as at present. So insidious is the disease that before one can diagnose the case there might be a dozen cases. Our hospital should be put in readiness and people should be made to understand that vaccination is necessary. Under the present mode of vaccination a person need not be kept from work and there is little if any danger of bad results.

The Council were unanimous in the opinion that a move should be made at once to prevent the disease from getting into our midst, that the provincial act of 1888 relating to vaccination be put into operation and that Dr. McLennan superintend the work, the same to be divided into three wards and given in charge of the different physicians of the town. It was also decided that the Council and health officer visit the hospital west of the town this forenoon and have the building put into proper condition for an emergency.

On motion it was also agreed that the health officer visit every vessel that enters our harbour, examine each and ascertain whether any cases are on board, and make other enquiries as to the health of those on board.

The light question was again discussed and the committee heard regarding their interview with the manager of the Electric Light Co. The matter was laid over until next regular meeting.

DETROIT, October 26.—The marriage and divorce statistics of Michigan for 1900 compiled by the secretary of state, shows that the number of marriages during the year was 23,295, and the number of divorce 2,418, or about one divorce for every ten marriages. Of the 2,418 divorces granted only 648 were upon the applications of husbands, while the number of wife applicants was 1,740.
