

### Man Travels 2,800 Miles To Enjoy City's Sun Rays

#### T. B. Grady Soon Will Pack Up His Auto And Motor From Florida To Canadian Home.

(St. Petersburg Daily Times)  
T. B. Grady, winter visitor from Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, Canada, travels 2,800 miles each winter to the Sunshine City, thereby escaping the blizzards and snow storm which rage about that part of the country. He and Mrs. Grady have been coming here for four seasons and this year they are living at 118 Twelfth street northeast. They plan to motor to their Canadian home in May.

Mr. Grady is a retired superintendent of the Canadian National railway, having resigned from active duty in March, 1930. He completed 51 years of service. He was superintendent of the Prince Edward Island division, with 220 miles of railroad under his jurisdiction.

The Canadian National railway, comprises 22,000 miles of rail and having 110,000 employees, is laid out in regions—the Atlantic, Central and Western regions. These regions, in turn, are in divisions, the Prince Edward Island division being in the Atlantic division. Winters are so severe in that part of Canada that there are often high drifts of snow to fight with shovels. The average temperature is 10 above zero.

From May until November the climate is ideal and it is at this time of the year that the Grady's, unable to withstand the pangs of homesickness, fill up their automobile with oil and gas and start on the 2,800 miles which leads to their summer home. Then, when the cold winds of November begin to sweep down around their Canadian home, which

is quite near the "Land of Evangeline," they again refill their automobile and, like the birds, set out for St. Petersburg.

Birthday greetings in wholesale quantity were being exchanged Monday by a group of Canadian winter visitors, three of whom were celebrating their seventy-first birthday anniversaries on the same day. These were H. H. Muttart and Mrs. T. B. Grady, who are twins, and J. W. Grady, a cousin.

Although approximately 2,800 miles from their home on Prince Edward Island, Mrs. Grady and Mr. Muttart were happy because they were celebrating their anniversary together. In Canada they live in towns only 48 miles apart. Mrs. Grady's home being in Charlottetown and Mr. Muttart's in Summerside. J. W. Grady, the cousin, left Canada when only seven years old and is from New York city and Capitol City, Me.

Mrs. Grady and her husband, who is a retired superintendent of the Canadian National Railway, have been coming to St. Petersburg for four seasons and this year are making their home at 118 Twelfth avenue northeast. Mr. Muttart is a retired salesman, having been connected with R. T. Holman, Ltd., for 49 years. This is his first winter here.

J. W. Grady and his wife have been coming to St. Petersburg for five years, and it was through their interest in this city that the Canadians left their Prince Edward Island home and came here.

The High Court of Australia was dismissed. Then Mr. Lang declared he would ask London to recall the governor, but this project was dropped. The Commonwealth government more uneasy at Premier Lang's extreme policies, set up a new Labor organization in the state. The so-called "moderate Labor party" came into being after several hot by-election clashes in which, paradoxically, moderate Labor fought bitterly against extreme Labor while other parties looked on. In April the newly established party warned labor unions and leagues that they would be declared "bogus" if they failed to align themselves with the new party. In other words, Federal moderate labor is willing to risk splitting the unions to assert its authority in the state. Federal members of parliament who have supported the ministry will be assured of their status in the general elections, when, if they are opposed by extremists, the people of the state will be given a clear opportunity to express their decision on the Lang policies.

And the extreme labor party met this threat with the establishment of an "army formation," to combat, as some of the more outspoken members have declared, violence with violence. Going far beyond the most extreme of radical plans that figured in the election campaign, Premier Lang's supporters fling about such statements as "the Labor army must become what the Red Army became in Russia," and "the working class must realize that if they are going to fight, it will be with machine-guns not ballot boxes." It might be going too far to say that Premier Lang sympathizes with these developments, certain it is that he has not given assurances to the contrary. Aroldy to combat "Red" tendencies, a sort of Fascist organization is growing up under cover in New South Wales. And a secession movement has started in the northern part of the state, seeking to create the new state of New England.

### EXTREMISTS RULE NEW SOUTH WALES

Since his accession to the premiership of New South Wales in October, 1930, for the second time, Hon. John Thomas Lang has become the recognized leader of the extreme Labor and trades union element, not only within his own state but throughout the Commonwealth. He was elected on a platform of maintenance of a high standard of living, reduction of interest payments on debts, and no wage cuts, as against the programme of economy and retrenchment of former premier Thomas Rainsford Baving.

Mr. Lang spoke of repudiating debt interest payments, particularly those going to Great Britain, for some time before his election and he is carrying out the policy now. On many occasions he was waxed bitter over the interest payments and finally he defaulted payments of more than \$3,000,000 due in London on April 1. At the same time a much smaller amount was paid in New York. The default however was more of a blow at the Commonwealth Labor Government than anybody else, for the Commonwealth Government legally liable for the payments. And on April 1 therefore the Commonwealth took the burden, then commenced the legal battle to recover the amounts from New South Wales.

Premier Lang puts his debt policy

this way: If the "British financial interests" which always figure in his speeches, will extend to Australia the same measure of debt cancellation or reduction that Great Britain gave to some of her Allies after the war, then Australia would be given a respite of two or three years and at the end of that time would be able and willing to pay her just commitments.

"For a brief two or three years Australia wants to use all her money resources to relieve distress in her own country," Premier Lang declared at Melbourne on April 14. "She wants you"—still addressing the British "financial interests"—"to agree to allow us to do it in the same manner as you agreed to allow Italy, France, Belgium, Portugal, and Greece." The holding back of \$180,000,000 now going out annually to overseas bondholders, he declared, would enable Australia to relieve unemployment and restore industry.

Hon. Mr. Lang has now incurred the opposition of all other state governments, as well as the federal ministry and other political parties. Extremists in the Commonwealth party, following Mr. Lang's leadership, have definitely broken with the bulk of the Labor Party. Two leftwing members of the cabinet were removed by Premier James Scullin. And yet for some weeks the extremists kept the government in power in close divisions at Canberra.

When the premiers' conference assembled at Melbourne in February Mr. Lang made a bold bid for general adoption of his radical policies. The conference was more or less shocked and Mr. Lang was bitterly assailed for speeches that were described as working with the Commonwealth's credit abroad. In the end the other premiers flatly rejected his proposals. On the other hand, when the New South Wales labor party assembled at Easter, there were forthcoming even more radical policies than those of Mr. Lang. The conference indeed passed a resolution calling for a three-year vest in a "people's government" the control and administration of specified industries, the banks and other services. Two days later however the conference reversed the decision in favor of Premier Lang's own policy of "socialization of industry. Which while somewhat similar in aim, was yet not so extreme as the original resolution.

Mr. Lang was born at Sydney on Dec. 21, 1876. He was mayor of Auburn for two years before he entered the legislative assembly in 1913. He represented Granville until 1920, then Parramatta until 1927, and again became premier following the state elections on Oct. 25, 1930.

Since his second term in the premiership, Hon. Mr. Lang has been fighting an unceasing battle with the upper house, the legislative council, in which there is an antagonistic majority. Charging the upper house with continual blocking tactics, he promptly asked Governor Sir Philip Game to approve the appointments of 43 new members, so the upper house could abolish itself. The governor refused to approve the appointments, and the chamber secured an injunction against any abolition measure. The state court found that abolition was a constitutional matter which could only be dealt with by a referendum, and the premier's appeal to

### Hon. J. G. Latham Leads Opposition

Hon. John Greig Latham, C.M.G., K.C., became leader of the Opposition in the Australian house of representatives after the Labor Government was returned to power in October 1929. Upon Mr. Latham fell the mantle of leadership of the Nationalist Party as Rt. Hon. Stanley Melbourne Bruce met personal defeat with the fall of his government and retired from politics.

Mr. Latham repeatedly expressed his willingness at Canberra to cooperate with the Scullin administration in battling the extremists. Now it appears that he will join forces with the Country Party under Rt. Hon. Dr. Earle Page in support of the new national movement started by Hon. J. A. Lyons; consolidating all right wing members for a great grapple with labor in the general election.

As well known outside Australia as any political leader of the Commonwealth, Mr. Latham started out on an academic and then legal career; not political. He was born at Victoria on Aug. 25, 1877, the son of Thomas Latham of Ivanhoe. Educated at the State School and University of Melbourne, he became lecturer on logic and philosophy, and subsequently on the law of contracts and personal property, at the University.

Mr. Latham was a lieutenant-commander in the Royal Australian Naval Reserve during the Great War. Afterwards he spent much time in Europe. He was a member of the staff of the Australian delegation to the Peace Conference at Paris, 1919. He became assistant secretary to the British Delegation, and was British Secretary to the Allied Commission on Czecho-Slovak affairs, etc.

An ardent believer in the League, Mr. Latham was the first president of the League of Nations Union of Australia. As a member of the Bruce Government, he represented Australia at the League of Nations and the Imperial Conference of 1926.

Hon. Mr. Latham was made a King's Council in 1922, the same year that he entered the Commonwealth Parliament as member for Kooyong. He became attorney-general of Australia in 1925, and held the post until the defeat of the Bruce Government in 1929. For the latter two years of this period he was also minister for industries.

In 1919 Mr. Latham wrote "The Significance of the Peace Treaty to Australia," and he was author of "Australia and the British Commonwealth," 1926.

He married Eleanor Mary Tobin of Northcote in 1907, and they have two sons and a daughter.
