SURPRISED TO FIND THAT HIS CAPTIVE WAS GENERAL

LONDON, Jan. 15.—There is no prouder soldier in Belgium today than Jean Jacques Rousseau, who, at the moment of writing, is being tended in a hospital at Osterend. Jean is only twenty years of age, but on his left breast he wears the Military Cross and two ribbons, one of the latter representing the Belgian Legion of Honor, King Albert having promised to present him with the medal on the first occasion possible. The deed which won the young Belgian soldier this proud distinction was no less than the capture, single-handed, of General Von Bulow, son of the famous German ex-Chancellor, and the story of the episode will, no doubt, inspire many a youthful Belgian in years to come. Rousseau was with a company of 150 men, at Zelk on August 22nd, when they were attacked by overwhelming numbers of Germans, and "it was while I was in ambush," he says, "that I saw about 900 yards distant an officer studying a map.

FOUND IT WAS GENERAL.

"Crawling quietly towards him, I managed to get within 400 yards, took careful aim, and fired. The officer fell, and when I went up to him I found, to my surprise, from the satchel, writing-case, papers, etc., that it was General Von Bulow. As he was only wounded in the leg I took him prisoner to Diest, riding with him on his horse. In his satchel were 165,000 francs, which was handed over to the Red Cross Society. But I retained his case and silver helmet as mementoes." Rousseau is suffering from a kick by a horse, and is anxious to get back to the fighting line again. His great ambition is to marry an English girl if he can. "I love English as much as my own countrymen," he says, "but there are many years yet to serve my country."

BELGIANS TEACH BRITISH FARMING SECRETS AS PAY

LONDON, Jan. 15.—England is to reap the benefits from the agricultural skill of the Belgian farmers, who are exiles in Great Britain. As a token of their appreciation of English hospitality, the Queen of the Belgians has suggested that the agricultural farmers in her country instruct English farmers in the system of intensive cultivation which has made Belgium famous the world over. A committee headed by Sir Richard Paget has been appointed, and arrangements are being made to delegate Belgian experts who will direct their fellow-countrymen in preparing English land for intensive cultivation. The English and Belgians alike are eager to have all Belgians return to their homes as soon as possible, but meantime there is a desire to make the Belgians as little burden as possible on England and the agricultural colony plan has been hit upon as a desirable means of employing Belgians where they will not be in direct competition with Englishmen. As many as five crops of vegetables are grown in a single year by the Belgians on tracts under glass. Only rough frames with ordinary window glass are required for this work. The Belgians farmers are able to make these themselves, and in many places in England they are already employed preparing the frames. The Belgian knowledge of soil culture is the secret of the great success the farmers of the little kingdom have achieved. A tiny tract of land, is sufficient to support a Belgian family in comfort, and the refugees are willing to impart their knowledge of soil treatment to their English hosts, who are in no sense competitors in the continental markets dominated by the Belgian gardeners.

DISTRIBUTE MESSAGE FROM LORD ROBERTS.

MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—The League of the Empire is making arrangements to have the late Lord Roberts' explanation of the war hung up in every school house in the Dominion. Just before his death, the veteran field marshal, at the request of the league, wrote a message to the children of the Empire, telling shortly and simply just why the Empire embarked on its present course. This message has been printed on large cards, headed by a photograph of the late Lord Roberts surrounded by the Allied flags, and these will soon make their appearance in Canada's public schools. Since its formation in 1901, the League of the Empire has established a scheme of correspondence between children throughout the Empire. At the present time there are over 27,000 members of this correspondence branch. The affiliation of schools in all parts of the Empire has also been accomplished, and hundreds of thousands of children in every part of the British Dominions have been brought into closer relations one with another. The Imperial Union of Teachers is also an outcome of the League's work. This work has received the recognition of the Ontario Legislature, on whose invitation the next Imperial Teachers' Conference will be held in Toronto in 1916, providing that peace has been declared. The Canadian Branch of the League of the Empire includes such significant names as those of Sir John and Lady Gibson, Hon. W. H. Hearst, Hon. F. Cochrane and President Falconer. The Canadian secretary is Mrs. H. S. Strathy.

More Practical Work.

Next week will be spent by some thirty of the senior officers of the camp in practical tactical work. Accompanied by Major Bickford, they will scour the country between Toronto and Hamilton in automobiles, to get instruction at to the proper handling of the men in their charge under varying conditions of actual warfare. Lieut.-Col. W. A. Brown has received six hundred pairs of wristlets for the artillerymen in camp from the Women's Patriotic League. Lieutenant Angus Sinclair, with a guard of 24 men of the 45th Highlanders, will convey another hundred prisoners of war, the majority coming from Kingston, up to the McPherson detention camp to-morrow evening.
