THE BASIC QUESTION.

We wish to get behind the irritation that may have been raised over the case of the Mayor and the Chairman of the Police Committee and calmly consider the facts and the position of the daily press of the city in regard thereto. The facts in brief are these:

Our civic constitution makes no provision to prevent liquor sellers from being elected to the City Council. One licensed liquor seller, to wit Angus McDonald of Queen Street, was elected to the Council at the last civic election. Our contention is that the law ought to be so amended that liquor sellers, whether licensed or otherwise, shall be ineligible for election to civic or municipal councils, as they are in most other American countries. But let that pass. After Mr. McDonald's election he was made Chairman of the Police Committee. Subsequently the Prohibitory Law came into force and he has since been twice convicted in the Police Court for selling liquor unlawfully.

Whereupon THE GUARDIAN called upon the Mayor to remove him from that position. We did this solely in the public interest, to save the credit of the City and with no sinister object in view. Our attitude towards the Mayor was friendly as it had always been. We saw that an unpleasant duty confronted him, and we wished to make it easier for him to discharge it, by assuring him of such support as we could give if he would make the dismissal. The Mayor resented our action with some heat and made unpleasant remarks, which we doubt not he has since regretted.

Be that as it may, the situation otherwise remains unchanged, McDonald, who has, as we believe sold more liquor illegally than any other three men in the City since the Prohibitory law came into operation, is still chairman of the Police Committee. Of late the principal business of the Police Court has been to deal with men who violate the liquor law, and with men made drunk by the illegal sale of liquor. The principal business of the Police force has been to deal with the same class of cases. And we maintained that it was a scandal and a disgrace to the City that one who has been a notorious violator of the law, and engaged in the business of making men drunk should be longer permitted to retain the office of Police Chairman.

Whether we were wrong or right in making this contention we leave for the intelligent and law-abiding portion of the community to say. No other city newspaper would have raised the point, but it seemed necessary for the credit of the community that it should be raised. And in pointing out the wrong it became equally a duty to indicate the remedy. We did this also, as we had done years ago when a civic official had been convicted in the Police Court, by calling for

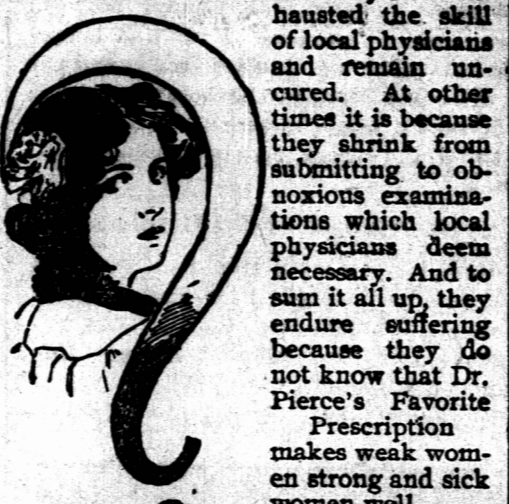
the dismissal of the offender from his civic office. We know of no other remedy so other means of terminating conditions which exist, and which are galling to, right thinking people.

It is manifest that in taking this action THE GUARDIAN had nothing to gain in the way of money, or patronage, or political, or journalistic advantage. We were doing simply what we conceived to be our duty in the premises—an unpleasant duty perhaps, but still a duty. We felt that in taking the course we did we were entitled to the support of our availing contemporaries in the City. We did not ask for it, however, and we certainly did not receive it. The Examiner says it is certainly unfitting that a convicted man should be either a Councillor or Chairman of Committees, but defends the Mayor for not dismissing him and condemns THE GUARDIAN. The Patriot, while posing as the friend of temperance and prohibition, apparently sees nothing out of the way in McDonald remaining Chairman of the Police Committee, though he has been for years a persistent violator of law, but finds no language too strong in which to condemn THE GUARDIAN for taking the matter up as it has.

Thus the political papers, to an unequal extent, throw their shelter around McDonald, objecting to the only method by which he could be removed, and give their help to perpetuate his tenure of office. The only explanation which we can offer for this attitude on the part of the two newspapers is that the Patriot fears to give offence to so influential a party man as McDonald, while the Examiner in any controversy between the temperance people and those engaged in the liquor traffic has usually given its sympathies to the latter. We greatly regret that these things are so. Our own ground is taken without regard to whether the other journals are with us or against us, or whether the majority of citizens do or do not share our views. It is better to be right than to be in the majority and we absolutely refuse our consent to the retention of a convicted ranseller as Chairman of Police.
