GOOD ROADS IS THEIR AIM.

NIAGARA FALLS, July 28—Co-operation between federal and state government in the good roads movement was advocated by the speakers at the opening session of the third annual convention of the national good roads congress here today. B. F. Youkam, of the St. Louis and San Francisco railroad, and Congressman William Sulzer, of New York, who presided, favored the idea of the federal government loaning money to the states for road building. In the general discussion which followed, Martin Dodge of Washington, spoke in favor of the national government making appropriations equal to the amount expended by the states for road construction. It is likely that a resolution will be adopted tomorrow endorsing some plan of co-operation between the national government and the respective states.

TELLS OF HUGE PLOT IN LODGE ROOM.

MONTREAL, July 28—The Civic Committee started work today on the charge of one Millette that members of the Emancipation Lodge were to inveigle priests to houses of ill-repute and thus spring a huge scandal on the coming Eucharistic Congress. Millette was sworn and testified that he and one Beaupre bored a hole through the Lodge room floor and overheard the plot discussed by several members of the Emancipation Lodge. It was stated that a committee has been appointed, a police officer being one of the number, and that although a member, Beaupre, a labor leader, denounced the whole scheme as a base low trick, the others went on with the arrangement. Beaupre the second eavesdropper corroborated everything said by the first witness.

SETTLEMENT BY ARBITRATION.

In Summerside yesterday dealers were paying from seventeen to eighteen cents a lb for butter, fourteen cents a doz for eggs, forty-one cents a bus for white oats and forty-three cents a bus for black.

A very interesting service "A Baby Given Away," on Sunday afternoon at the Salvation Hall, Summerside Mothers and fathers are especially invited. Brigadier Adby will have charge of the service.

In Alberton yesterday dealers were paying thirty-six cents a bus for oats, fifteen to seventeen cents a bus for butter, fourteen and one half cents a doz for eggs, twenty-three cents a lb for wool and six and a half cents a lb for hides.

The S. S. City of Ghent arrived in Summerside about 6 p. m. on Thursday last with a very large freight, including 500 barrels of cement, and left again early yesterday morning for Halifax, taking considerable freight from Halifax.

Dr. and Mrs. McGrath have the sympathy of the community on the death of their baby girl. The death occurred yesterday and the little one was buried in the Roman Catholic cemetery Newcastle Advocate July 26. Dr. McGrath is a native of Prince county.

The custom and post office officials in Summerside are collecting clothing and supplies for the sufferers by the Campbellton fire, report that goods are being handed in freely. They shipped a large case of supplies on Thursday, another one yesterday and expect to have another one ready for shipment today. They would be pleased to have supplies of any kind, such as clothing, vegetables, etc., handed in to them and they will be forwarded promptly.

A special collection in aid of the building fund of the Campbellton Presbyterian congregation will be taken up in the Presbyterian Church, Summerside, tomorrow. All contributions to this fund are to be placed in envelopes and marked Campbellton fund. There will also be a collection at the Catholic Church, Summerside, tomorrow for the benefit of the Catholic sufferers by the Campbellton fire, and a similar collection will be taken up in the Methodist Church on the first Sunday in August.
