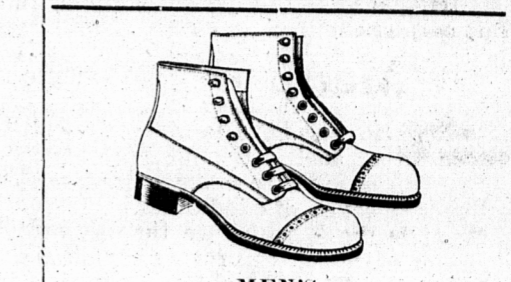

The Great Attraction At Port Borden Thousands of children throughout the island and equal numbers of their elders are supremely happy all because John Robinson's big circus is coming to Borden for afternoon and night Friday July 4th. This circus will be the first to visit Prince Edward Island in years and the only one to come with a complete menagerie. Mr. Robinson wanted to bring his show to Charlottetown but he found that it would be impossible to draw his heavy extra length cars over the narrow gauge road. He did the next best thing selected Borden and had promised to ferry his entire show and menagerie from the mainland. To prove that he means just what he says he will forfeit \$10,000 to the Red Cross and the Salvation Army if he fails to transport the complete menagerie to the island. The cost of bringing the big show to Borden will be large. The price to move the two trains of thirty cars from Truro to Borden will be \$1200 and from Borden to Moncton, \$900. The daily expense of the big aggregation is \$5,000. With the show are ten elephants, seven camels, cages of lions, tigers, leopards, a baby hippopotamus, bears, kangaroos, deer and many other animals; three hundred performers, two hundred horses, almost one thousand employees and a main exhibition tent that will seat ten thousand people. The Island branch of the Canadian Government Rys will run a number of regular and special trains from all points on the island to Borden and will return the crowds after the performances. The show will be started at two and eight o'clock and will be given interreg, on two stages, in an aerial enclave and around a hippodrome racing track. The Canadian Government Rys decided to haul but one circus through Canada this summer and selected John Robinson's because it is the largest and best.
