TODAY'S MEETINGS—The annual school meetings in many country districts in past years have always been poorly attended. Today, Tuesday, however, will likely find the ratepayers turning out in force, to support, or approve the proposed large increase in the teachers' supplements. The problem of how to keep our teachers in the province away from the lure of the West, is an interesting and important one. New Brunswick is attempting to solve the conundrum by requiring all applicants for admission to the provincial normal school to put up a bond for \$100 as a pledge that they will teach in New Brunswick for at least three years after they are qualified, or forfeit the hundred dollars. Meanwhile, suggestion that "our school districts should attempt a supplement at least equal to the amount of the statutory allowance to teachers" is interesting. Supplements of from two to four hundred dollars should certainly be an effective means of keeping teachers in this province.—Q.
