THE FOOD TAX PREFERENCE DEAD.—LONDON, Jan. 23.—Speaking at the city of London free trade meeting Monday, Lord Avebury referred to the Unionist policy of food taxation and the recent Unionist speeches. Lord Lansdowne and Honar Law did not wish to put on food taxes, and would only do so if the Dominions insisted. This he felt sure the Dominions never would do. SAYS HIGH COST LIVING IS NOT DUE TO FARMERS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Charges by Prof. L. L. Corbett, horticulturist in the department of agriculture, that the agricultural wealth of the country was overestimated twice and sometimes three times caused a stir among officials of the department today. Prof. Corbett made his declaration in the course of a lecture before the Y. M. C. A. last night. "We record the corn, wheat and hay the farmers produce," he told his hearers, "as well as the cattle hogs and other animals he raises never stopping to think that the animals are fed on the crops." Prof. Corbett issued a warning that unless the farmers received just prices for their produce they "would unite the country over and starve the cities into paying them anything they ask."
