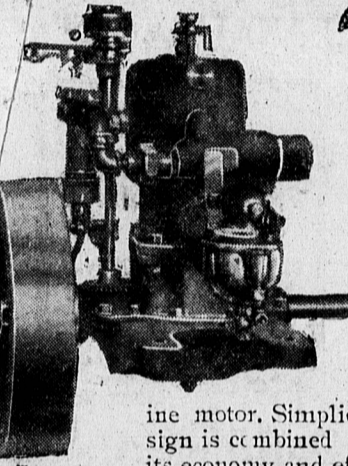

CROSSED CHANNEL LIKE FLOCK OF BIRDS

DOVER, Eng., July 3.—Only by making the cross-channel flight under some extraordinary circumstances will any aviator ever be able hereafter to gain any particular glory from the feat. After today the flight must be considered an ordinary affair, for this morning saw no less than eleven contestants in the international circuit race wending their way across the channel and alighting in Dover, as easily as a flock of birds might have done. Moreover one of the eleven—Renaux—carried a passenger in his biplane.

They had but a short time to wait before Vendrines, consistently the leader in the previous series of the races drove his monoplane into view out of a bank of fleecy clouds that hung low over the Channel. He made a circuit of the aerodrome and landed gracefully accomplishing the flight from Calais is about half an hour.

The other contestants followed in quick succession. Seven monoplanes were almost hunched, then came two biplanes and another monoplane brought up the rear. Everything went as orderly as in an ordinary fashioned horse race meeting. One by one the machines appeared over the trees, swept down to the aerodrome, circled it, and landed without a semblance of a mishap.

There was none of the excitement that characterized the finish of the previous cross-channel flights, nor were the aviators exhausted. Instead, they crawled from their aeroplanes, and calmly walked away with friends while their machines were taken to the hangers to be overhauled very much as a race horse might be led to its stable for a rub-down.

Soon after the last aviator had landed the wind began to freshen, and it was decided to start immediately on the next stage of the contest to Shoreham and on to London. The start was accordingly made and with the same precision that had characterized the arrival at Dover. The machines left at two minute intervals, only one exceeding that time, and that only by a few seconds. A number of Army officers were deeply interested spectators of today's flight across the Channel.

Vendrines won the prize of \$1,000 for the fastest flight from Dover to Shoreham, Elbert who won the Boy's trophy for the fastest Channel flight, made the distance in 37 minutes, 57 seconds.

HEROIC RESCUE MADE AT SEA

BOSTON, July 3.—Seven fishermen were rescued in the sea of Japan by the British steamship Matoppo, Capt. Dornand, which arrived yesterday from the far East. During a terrific gale officers of the steamship sighted a tiny boat with men lying almost dead in its bottom.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in effecting the rescue. The Japanese government, in recognition of the heroic action on the part of the officers and crew of the Matoppo, will present Capt. Dornand a set of solid silver cups. The castaways were landed at Kuchinotsu.

At noon Thursday Ahf Fong, one of the Matoppo's Chinese firemen was buried at sea. The man had died of heart disease and the other 23 Chinamen aboard prepared the body for burial. They requested that the ship be stopped and her bow pointed toward China. This, they said, would insure a speedy return of Ahf Fong to his native land. The body, shrouded in white, was then lowered overboard, and with it went the dead man's clothes and an iron box of food and matches.

UNIVERSAL MILITARY SERVICE IN AUSTRALIA

LONDON, July 3.—Despatches received here say that the universal military service went into effect in the Australian commonwealth on Saturday, when the first batch of cadets went to camp.

TO LINK SOUTH PACIFIC BY WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

LONDON, July 3.—Sir Joseph Ward, Premier of the Dominion of New Zealand, while attending the Imperial Conference has been telling the English public something of the plan by which New Zealand has undertaken to connect the Pacific Islands by wireless telegraphy.

Two high and five low-power stations are to be established in the Dominion. With the former New Zealand will be able to communicate with Melbourne and Sydney at all times. Stations will also be established at Fiji and some of the other Pacific Islands, and Sir Joseph is hopeful that a chain of stations linking up all parts of the Pacific will be completed.

er, after which Rev. W. H. Heartz, D. D., was called upon. He said he believed he could say, without fear of being unjustly called a person, who had kissed the "hilarity stone," that his nephew, by his generous givings, and by his unselfish and earnest labors, has laid the Methodists of Charlottetown under great obligations for the way in which he has perpetuated his father's name. He said that the lectern and three chairs on the platform were there in memory of his mother, having been furnished by his two sisters and himself. The learned Doctor spoke of the earlier history of the Church, and of its pioneers and their difficulties. He said this building would show a contributory source to the development of that righteousness that exalts a nation, and to that nobility of character that shone luminous in the sky of eternity. Space will not permit a fuller report of Dr Heartz' excellent address.

Miss Hazel Bremner's singing formed a pleasing feature of the program, after which the special dedicatory service provided for such occasions, was conducted by Rev Mr Thomas.

The building was then formally presented to the trustees by F. R. Heartz, W. R. Shute sang one of his pleasing solos, and the following resolution was moved by F. S. Moore, seconded by James Paton, and unanimously carried:

Whereas for a great many years the work of the Church has been greatly hampered for want of a suitable building, modern in its appointments and equipment and sanitary in its conditions, and whereas this long felt want has been supplied through the munificence of the representatives of one of our oldest and most honored families, therefore, resolved that the best thanks of the officials, members and adherents of the First Methodist Church of Charlottetown, be and are hereby tendered to the executors of the estate of the late Richard Heartz and to Frank R. Heartz, Esq for this gift to the church of this beautiful building so complete in all its appointments and so fully equipped for Sabbath School and social and religious services. To be known as the Benjamin Heartz Memorial Hall. Also to Rev W. H. Heartz, D. D., for his kind interest and valuable assistance and for the handsome platform furniture, consisting of chairs and lectern.

After some remarks by Rev Mr Thomas and Rev Dr Heartz, Gro E. Hughes moved the following resolution, which was seconded by R. H. Beer and carried unanimously. Recognizing the untiring efforts of the Ladies Aid Society in all matters pertaining to the welfare of this Church, and especially in the generous support they have given towards the furnishing of the well equipped and up to date building, we do now, on behalf of the members of the congregation of this Church, tender to them a most sincere and hearty vote of thanks.

The exercises were brought to close by the singing of the doxology and pronouncing of a benediction.
