Mr. Frank Boutellier has his horses looking well and feeling well. All of them show improvement in their workouts, the three year horses showing increased speed every week while the other aged horses of the string will be let down gradually. We look to see a certain pacer in Mr. Boutellier's string shade 2:15 this year.

The Matinee Races of the Charlottetown Driving Club which will be held Wednesday afternoon will be without doubt the best ever staged by the Club. Every class is filled with good horses, evenly matched, which, after all, is what is necessary to make good races for spectators. There will be four classes so that a well afternoon's sport is assured. Among the entries in Class D is Prince Louis, owned by Mr. Arsenault of Rustico. This horse won some races on the ice last winter and is considered by the friends of Mr. Arsenault good enough to win his class. The Class A, B, and C races are all filled with good horses. Class B, which is a trot, has an especially large entry, and we predict that this will be the feature race of the meet.
