QUEBEC'S ANTI-ALCOHOL CRUSADE
From more than 1400 parish churches in Quebec a pastoral letter was read on Sunday, November 13th signed by Cardinal, Jean Marie Rodrigue, Villeneuve, Archbishop of Quebec, by the Archbishop Coadjutor of Montreal, the Archbishop of Ottawa and all the Bishops of the Church in the Province. This letter enjoined upon the Province's civil authorities, professional and business men, and social classes to collaborate with the Roman Catholic Church in a great temperance crusade to stamp out alcoholism as a matter of individual and national infamy.
In the temperance crusade, physicians were urged to tell "whether or not alcohol is a danger to health in law and criminologists to discuss "laws and sanctions which tend to foster temperance" and sociologists to show "by statistics how alcohol wastes the wealth of a people."
"May all those gifted by Providence with talent and influence demand the social duty incumbent upon them to collaborate with us in opening this campaign of temporal and spiritual reformation," the letter suggested.
"True science and common sense in perfect accord with truth will always prove that all beverages containing alcohol are a danger to the physical, intellectual and moral life of the individual, to peace in the family and to the prosperity of the nation."
"For years, physicians have declared that alcohol is the bed of tuberculosis. Facts prove that they are undeniably right," added the letter.
An "incomplete" estimate of Quebec Province's expenditure for non-ferrous metals in the past 15 years was given by the letter as \$700,000,000. Increase in the sale of beer in Quebec in 1937 was estimated at \$1,500,000 while the Province, with only 28 per cent of Canada's population, was credited with 51 per cent of the Dominion's entire beer consumption.

MR. THOMAS P. KINCH

ROME, Jan. 12 — (AP) — Authorities at the Royal Palace today informed that Princess Mafalda, second daughter of King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Elena who had been stricken with pneumonia, is better.

WAR MATERIAL BAN DEMANDED
W.C.T.U. MASS MEETING SENDS PETITION TO PREMIER KING.
A telegram petitioning the Prime Minister of Canada and the Canadian Parliament to place an embargo upon the shipment of war material to aggressor nations has been despatched to Ottawa, following a mass meeting held at the Baptist Church, Vancouver, called by the Provincial W.C.T.U. and presided over by Mrs. J. Grav, Provincial President.
Speeches endorsing a policy of embargo on raw material for war munitions being shipped to Japan, and a boy's own road to that country, were made by Mrs. Stuart Jamieson, Eric Martin, of Vancouver Youth Council, Sam Shearer and Rev. G. Harrison Vilett, of Canadian Memorial Church. E. Simpson, of Nanaimo, read briefly of what citizens had been trying to do in stopping a shipment of scrap iron from that place.
The preamble of the resolution pointed out that normal export of non-ferrous metals and other war supplies to Japan and other aggressor nations had enormously increased in the past year and that war material furnished by Canada is being used in part to equip those who are fighting for freedom in China and elsewhere.
Mrs. Stuart Jamieson said that the trade in war munitions to Japan had increased from \$8,500,000 in 1936 to \$17,500,000 in 1937.
"Prime Minister Mackenzie King said the reason why it was not stopped was because it might injure Canada in a war with Japan," she said, "but there is no danger of that now."
Eric Martin said the Youth Council was practically unanimous on the question, "Halt the exportation of metal, and cripple the Japanese war machine," he said. Dr. G. Harrison Vilett warned of the danger of China being driven into
