\$120,000 DAY RANCH.— One of the largest ranch deals transacted within the province was consummated on Tuesday evening when J. J. Bowen, brother of P. L. Bowen, a ranchman of the Calgary district purchased for cash the well-known "Q" ranch from "Tony" Day, of Medicine Hat. The "Q" is a property consisting of some 6,000 acres of land in southern Alberta, on the international boundary, and with it was sold about 1,000 head of Percheron and Clyde horses. The price which had been asked by Mr. Day was \$200,000. Mr. Bowen the purchaser is brother of Mr. D. B. Bowen of Cardigan, announces that he will continue to make his home, as at present, in Saskatchewan and that he will have a manager, who will take charge of the "Q" ranch. "Tony" Day, a former Texan, has been the owner of the "Q" ranch and several other ranching properties in the southern part of the province for many years, and is the uncle of "Ad" Day, well-known stampede promoter. Mr. Bowen is the Liberal nominee for a Dominion house, from one of the northern Saskatchewan constituencies. The deal was for all cash.

LT. COL. MONS. BURKE FAVORS CONSCRIPTION.

HALIFAX.— On Saturday evening in the big shed at Pier Two, a Halifax Herald representative (found Lieutenant-Colonel (Monseigneur) Burke and Lieutenant-Colonel (Senator) G. W. Fowler. They had come across from England and were trying to straighten out some baggage troubles preparatory for boarding the train for Toronto. The trouble was short-lived and the two friends, finding they would have several hours more to wait, decided to take a little stroll on the waterfront and seek a position from which could be seen the ships passing in and out of the harbor.

Two such men seemed to offer to the reporter an opportunity for an interview. They were promptly led into a discussion of the political situation, but with strict censorship provisions. Very emphatically, however, Monseigneur Burke declared: "We surely favor conscription." The New Brunswick Senator was decidedly of the same opinion.

Monseigneur Burke was asked if it were true, as had been reported in a number of papers on this side of the Atlantic, that it was his intention to join the forces of the United States. Monseigneur Burke neither confirm or deny the report but seemed much interested in discovering that the newspapers had been giving circulation to a report of that nature. "You know," said he, "that when I came back from overseas last winter for a brief trip I visited through the United States and went south as far as Cuba. I have many friends over there and great was my delight when the United States entered the war."

Of the trip across the Atlantic they were first the communicative. Their story of the baby show in mid-Atlantic was most interesting. Forty-three babies under two years of age were entered. Monseigneur Burke was the chief judge, but said he was much indebted to Mrs. Andrew and Lieutenant-Colonel Mayes, both of Winnipeg. It was Senator Fowler who volunteered the information that while there were forty-three babies there were also forty-three prizes, the chief judge being too much of a diplomat to offend any mother. There were first prizes being about stakes, and a strange thing about the awarding of these was the fact that Winnipeg took all the best ones. Toronto coming second, Cecil Whitford, of English birth, but with a daddy who enlisted in Winnipeg, was admitted to the banner baby of the bunch. He was born early last April, John Graton, another soldier's baby, with the prospects of having Toronto as his future home, was a close second. He, too, was born in April last.

Lieutenant-Colonel Burke was also chairman of the athletic sports and races held on board his majesty's ship, somewhere on the Atlantic, July 17th and 18th. With him on the committee were Lieutenant-Colonel Shillington, Mayes, McCrobie, Fowler, Major Barry W. Roscoe, D. S. O., and other prominent officers.

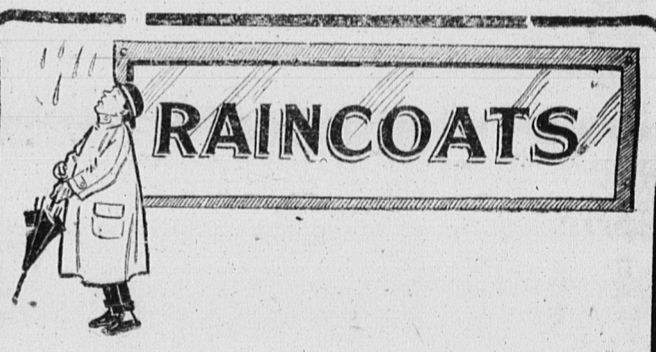
