HEALTH-HABITS AS BEAUTY AIDS
My mail often contains pleas for help from readers who have "tried everything" to improve their complexions. Everything in this sense, external applications used at home with no special attention to diet or general health. It is true that a simple change from one kind of soap to another sometimes produces a marked improvement in the complexion, but when skin blemishes do not respond to such treatments it is time to look deeper into their cause.

The dry sensitive skin; the scaly, oily skin; the rough skin with enlarged pores and pimples, all require more than local treatments to restore them their normal fitness and beauty. Let me take each of these types in turn and indicate very briefly what sort of treatments are required in each case.

There is, first, the dry sensitive skin that looks flaky when powdered. It should be cleansed with cold cream or special cleansing oil in place of soap and water. A mild astringent such as witch-hazel should be used after the cleansing. Be sure to remove every trace of the cleansing cream and dust from the surface of the skin. Moisten a pad of clean, absorbent cotton in the astringent and wipe the skin. Now some fresh cold cream may be applied and left overnight. Cold cream should also be used as a powder base. Once a week have a thorough facial treatment with massage and a suitable face pack. So much for external treatments. Build up your weight to normal. Have a well-balanced diet including at least a pint of rich milk daily, exercise enough each day to cause sweating.

The scaly, oily skin indicates a low degree of physical fitness. More raw fruit and vegetables and drinking less fatty, fried foods and pastries, a warm cleansing bath should be taken every night and a cold shower or rub-down every morning to stimulate the system. Fresh air and outdoor exercise are essential. The skin should be cleansed with plenty of warm water and soap daily. A few drops of spirits of camphor or tincture of benzoin should be put into the last rinsing water to act as an astringent.

The rough, pimply skin also needs external and internal treatments such as I have just described. Constipation must be overcome. A healing salve should be applied to the blemishes and left on overnight.

In Memoriam
JAMES PICKERING
After a year of illness which he bore with Christian patience and fortitude, there peacefully departed at his home in Clinton P. E. Island on Dec. 7th, 1928, Mr. James Pickering, aged 73 years. There passed peacefully away at her home in Milltown Cross on Nov 14th 1928 in the person of Mrs. Neil MacKinnon at the age of 68 years. The deceased had been in failing health for the past two years, though she had only three months previous to her death. The late Mrs. MacKinnon, who before her marriage was Miss Charlotte Elizabeth Moore of Albion Bay, P. E. I. married Neil MacKinnon in the year 1885, moving to Milltown and resided there until her death.
