E. W. Bowness New Vice Pres. Utilities Firms

(Calgary Herald) E. W. Bowness has been appointed vice-president of the Dominion Gas and Electric Company and its various subsidiaries, including the Calgary and Edmonton Gas Companies, Canadian Utilities Limited, Union Power Company Limited, and the Nansimo and Duncan Electrical Companies. It was announced Wednesday in the absence of H. R. Miller, the president. Mr. Bowness will assume his duties. Mr. Bowness for some years past has been a director of these operating companies and manager of the electrical subsidiaries of Dominion Gas and Electric Company. He was born in Kensington, Prince Edward Island, educated at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, graduated with the degree of B.Sc. at McGill University, and has been a resident of Alberta for more

than 20 years. He is a member of the Engineering Institute of Canada, of the Association of Professional Engineers of Alberta and British Columbia, and a number of other engineering societies. He has wide engineering and public utility experience. At one time he was professor of engineering at the Case School of Applied Science, Cleveland, Ohio, and later was connected with large public utilities in Portland, Oregon, and was manager of the light and power department of the Mount Hood Railway and Power Company and other companies at that city. In 1913, Mr. Bowness was appointed efficiency engineer of the city of Edmonton to reorganize the municipal utilities and later was engaged by a syndicate headed by Sir John Jackson of London, England, which had in view the development of a hydro-electric power scheme on the north Saskatchewan river. He has been actively engaged as a consulting engineer and manager of utilities in Eastern and Western Canada and in the United States.

WORDS ACTUALLY NEEDED

CHICAGO, July 10.—Of the 400,000 or more words in the English language, only 850 are actually needed in ordinary conversations, Miss Mary L. Guyton, supervisor of adult education in Massachusetts, said today.

Miss Guyton appeared on an adult education program to explain the "basic" English works of Professor C. K. Ogden of Cambridge, England, who was unable to be here because of a change of plans. "Professor Ogden says there are 1,500 languages acting as barriers to world understanding. Since English is used by 500,000,000 people he believes a basic language of English can be used as an international auxiliary."

MRS. E. J. H. MORRISSEY The death in this city on Tuesday last of Mrs. E. J. H. Morrissey was learned with deep regret by many friends in and beyond this province. Mrs. Morrissey had apparently been in excellent health, but on Tuesday at 2 o'clock in the afternoon she entered the Charlottetown Hospital for treatment and passed away six hours later. She was educated at Notre Dame Convent and Union Commercial College and was an accomplished musician. A talented player of the violin, she was often heard in entertainments in this city. For five years prior to her marriage she was stenographer and cashier with the Prince Edward Island Egg and Poultry Co-operative Association. Possessing beautiful qualities of mind and heart, she greatly endeared herself to all who knew her well. She leaves to mourn, besides her sorrowing husband and parents, two sisters, Jean at home and E. S. Jan of the Notre Dame Order, Tignish, the latter being in Charlottetown when her sister passed away. There is also a half brother, Colin, residing in San Francisco. Mrs. Morrissey's death has brought unusual sadness to her bereaved husband and other relatives. With them it is indeed a case of sorrow never coming singly. Mr. and Mrs. Morrissey were called upon to mourn the loss of their first born child in January, 1932.
