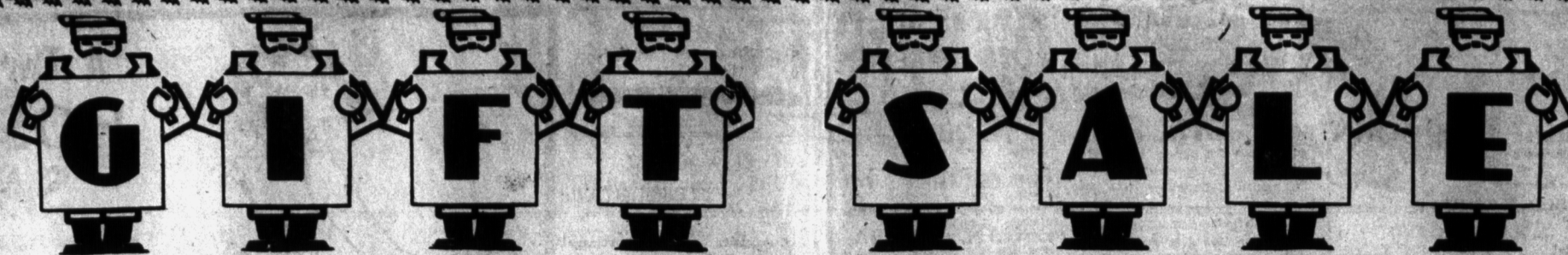

British Policy One Of watchful Waiting

LONDON, Nov. 28.—Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, indicated in the House of Commons today that the government's attitude toward the American dollar's relation to the pound sterling was still one of watchful waiting.

When a questioner asked him from the floor what alteration of policy would be made in connection with the exchange equalization fund as a consequence of the recent dollar fluctuation the Chancellor replied:

"I am carefully watching the situation in all its aspects." He said he considered it unnecessary and undesirable to say more at present and turned down a suggestion by another questioner regarding the advisability of considering the establishment of an Empire currency in view of the dollar fluctuation.

"No such proposal is at present under consideration," said Mr. Chamberlain.

Announces Engagement Of Daughter

OTTAWA, Nov. 28.—The minister of the United States to Canada and Mrs. W. D. Robbins today announced the engagement of their daughter, Irene Helen, to Alexander Cochrane Forbes, of Boston, Mass.

Miss Robbins attended Fermate School, Alton, S. C., and made her debut at Tuxedo Park and Washington in 1922. She is a member of the Junior League of Washington.

Discusses N. S. Relief Matters

OTTAWA, Nov. 28.—Unemployment relief matters in Nova Scotia were under discussion here today before Hon. Wesley A. Gordon, Dominion Minister of Labor, and Premier Angus L. MacDonald, of Nova Scotia.

Details of a proposal for the inclusion of a municipal public works programme in Nova Scotia were considered. A further discussion will be held tomorrow, and there was no statement to make tonight.

Early Canadian Cheese

The early French settlers in Canada brought the art of making cheese from France. Certain families on the Island of Orleans still make a peculiar cheese for which the process has been handed down from generation to generation for 300 years.

The United Empire Loyalists brought with them from the United States a knowledge of the manufacture of Cheddar type of cheese into different parts of Ontario over one hundred years ago. All cheese in Canada was made on farms until 1864 when the first cheese factory was started.

Increase In Net Profits Of C. P. Railway

MONTREAL, Nov. 28.—(C.P.)—Net profits of \$4,086,447 for the month of October were reported today by the Canadian Pacific Railway. This is an increase of \$134,873 over net profits of \$3,951,574 for October 1932.

Gross earnings were down from \$12,770,731 to \$11,994,497 compared with October last year while working expenses decreased from \$8,356,197 to \$7,928,061.

Net profits for the 10 months ended October were \$14,000,626, a decrease of \$426,044 from \$14,426,670 in the same period last year.

Marking Export Egg Cases

No case containing Canadian eggs for export out of Canada, the Egg Regulations prescribe, shall be shipped unless it is, before shipment, marked on both ends in a legible and indelible manner, with the correct name of the grade of eggs contained therein according to the Canadian Standards, and the words "Canadian Eggs." Canadian standard cases contain thirty dozen eggs.

All-Ireland Gov. Impossible Says Ulster Premier

BELFAST, Ireland, Nov. 28.—(P. Cable)—"There can be no question of an all-Ireland Parliament," declared Viscount Craigavon, Premier of Ulster since the Irish partition, in a statement tonight two days before polling in the Northern Ireland general elections.

Thursday's voting cannot affect the results, for the Unionist Government got enough seats through acclamation on nomination day to again assure it of a majority over all other parties.

Viscount Craigavon, who has been forbidden by his doctor to participate actively in the campaign, said he believed Ulster would be a permanent buffer between England and the Irish Republic, for he could not see President Eamon de Valera proclaiming a republic in a partitioned Ireland.

"You admit, then," said an Alabama Judge, "that you stole the hog?"
