Confession of Murder Found in a Bottle

ROCHESTER, N. Y. July 4.—"Oh God forgive me for my sins. I have killed three people," signed J. Small, scribbled on the back of a confectionery label and found in a floating bottle by a fisherman off Manitou Beach yesterday, is giving the sheriff of Monroe County a mystery to solve.

The bottle bore the name of a Chicago soft drink manufacturer, and the label on which the note was written was imprinted with the name of a Toronto confectionery house.

Rochester authorities are investigating in an effort to determine whether the mysterious note has any connection with the disappearance of Ambrose Small, missing millionaire theatrical magnate.

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Grand Circuit Will Open at North Randall Track Monday

CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 4—The forty-ninth renewal of the Grand Circuit series of light harness races will be inaugurated at North Randall on Monday. Nine-teen races are programmed for the meeting. Four of them are fixtures which have appeared in the card since the track was opened in 1910.

The Ohio and Tavern events carry \$5,000 purses. The Ohio is for the 2,08 trotters. In it McGregor the Great will in all probability make his first start since 1919 when he carried everything before him in his four year old form. The other candidates include Czarworthy from the Murphy stable the half-mile track record breaker Herbelwyn, Voltage, Just David and Walter Sterling. McDonald has the Great Rose and King Watts in this race. The latter was not started since 1920 while the Peter the Great will show that she was one of the fastest three year olds in training last season. The double gaited champion Prince Loree is also named. If he races up to what he has shown in his work it will take a 2:05 trotter to catch him.

Lorena Watts, a winner at Sandusky, will make her first start over the mile tracks this year in the Tavern Stake. She will be in hot company as the other entries include Laurel Hall or Long Set from the Good Tim Stable, David Axworthy, Princess Etawah, a 2:03 trotter last year, and Taurida, one of the most formidable members of the Hillendale Stable.

Twenty-two youngsters are named to start in the three year old trot. It will give the public its first line on the futurity material of 1922. Of this lot Ben White has been winning over the half-mile tracks with Lee Worthy while Eddie has credited the well known pacer Adloo Guy with his first performer. She is a member of Fred Edman's stable. Brook Farm will start Elth Worthy with which it made a good showing in the two year old events in 1921, while Murphy will in all probability take the word being Billy Smith. The other eligible candidates include Smiley, Mary Sedley, Axwah, and Eleanor Worthy.

Halifax Races

HALIFAX, July 4.—The Halifax race track which has recently been put in shape by Frank Adams was opened to the public on July 1st, there being an attendance of over four thousand people. The stand which seats nearly two thousands was crowded long before the start of the first race. There were four races on the card. The 2:24 trot and pace was won by Crown J. Willred Hal, formerly of P. E. Island, being second; best time, 2:22 1-4. The 2:46 trot and pace was won by Maple Leaf Hal in straight heats, with Lord Kitchener second; best time 2:22 1-4. He named race was won by Fred Locanda, with Frank Ambulator second best time 2:22. The success of these races will no doubt be the means of putting on a big program for the sports carnival in August.
