OTTAWA, April 20.—Now regarding statements, reports or opinions, or the verbal expression of opinions, which may tend to weaken or obstruct the united effort of the people of Canada in the prosecution of the war, were promulgated in the form of an Order-in-Council, which received the assent of the Governor-General today.

Documents to Prove Austria's Peace Overtures

PARIS, April 17.—Premier Clemenceau and M. Flicheux, the Foreign Minister will place before the Committees of Foreign Affairs, the Army and the Navy all information of the Austrian Emperor's letters and the declarations of Count Czernin, the former Austria-Hungarian Foreign Minister. These documents comprise one hundred and forty-eight despatches, or more than a quarter of the Chamber.

The Temps points out that the two classes of facts with which the Government's explanation deal, are not of equal importance.
